STAFF'S ARGUMENT TO ADOPT THE PROPOSED DECISION

Respondent Jerry Jones (Respondent) applied for Industrial Disability Retirement based on an orthopedic condition (right knee and foot). By virtue of his employment as a Correctional Officer (CO) for Respondent California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, California State Prison, Pleasant Valley State Prison (Respondent CDCR), he was a state safety member of CalPERS. CalPERS determined that Respondent was not disabled, and Respondent appealed. A hearing was completed on May 24, 2016.

On April 22, 2016, CalPERS sent a letter to the Respondent which explained the hearing process and the need to support his case with witnesses and documents. CalPERS provided Respondent with a copy of the administrative hearing process pamphlet. CalPERS answered Respondent's questions and clarified how to obtain further information on the process.

At the hearing the Respondent testified that his disability occurred in September 20, 2012. Respondent testified that he was injured due to "cumulative trauma over the course of my career." He further testified that he would be unable to perform the essential functions of his job as a CO because of his right knee and foot pain.

As part of CalPERS' review of his medical condition, Respondent was referred for an Independent Medical Examination (IME) to Orthopedic Surgeon Dr. Ghol Ha'Eri. Dr. Ha'Eri interviewed Respondent, took Respondent's work history, and reviewed Respondent's job descriptions, medical records and diagnostic studies. He also performed a comprehensive IME examination. Dr. Ha'Eri found age appropriate degenerative changes in Respondent's right knee and foot.

Dr Ha'Eri opined that there were no specific job duties that Respondent was unable to perform, and that Respondent was not substantially incapacitated from performing the duties of a CO. At the hearing, Dr. Ha'Eri testified to his examination and report. Dr. Ha'Eri's medical opinion is that Respondent is not substantially disabled.

Respondent testified on his own behalf. He did not call any physicians or other medical professionals to testify.

The Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) found that Respondent bears the burden to show by a preponderance of evidence (based on competent medical evidence) that his symptomology renders him unable to perform his usual job duties. The ALJ found that Respondent failed to carry his burden of proof and that Respondent did not establish by competent, objective medical opinion, that, at the time of application, he was permanently disabled or incapacitated from performing his usual duties of a CO for Respondent CDCR.

The ALJ concluded that Respondent's appeal should be denied. The Proposed Decision is supported by the law and the facts. Staff argues that the Board adopt the Proposed Decision.

Because the Proposed Decision applies the law to the salient facts of this case, the risks of adopting the Proposed Decision are minimal. The member may file a Writ Petition in Superior Court seeking to overturn the Decision of the Board.
