#### **Tom Lussier, President, The Lussier Group**

Tom Lussier is President of The Lussier Group, governmental affairs consulting firm based in Alexandria, Virginia. The Lussier Group offers a full range of government-related consulting services and legislative representation primarily focused on public employee pension and health benefits. He has the distinction of being the youngest person elected to the Massachusetts House of Representatives; he was first elected in 1977 at the age of nineteen. In 1976, Tom was elected to the City Council in Pittsfield, Massachusetts.

Tom is a former member of the Massachusetts Retirement Law Commission, and a former Trustee of the Methuen Contributory Retirement System in Methuen, Massachusetts.

In this capacity, he also served in a major role for the U.S. Bipartisan Commission on Health Care (also known as the "Pepper Commission").
