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I. Introduction

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Mr. Mangalathil suffers not only with physical but mental disability as well. On 8/9/2021,

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On August 11, 2021, CALPERS denied application [See attached Exb 26 A307 non-

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beneficial letter dated Aug 11, 2021] stating that:

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We have determined, based on your age and years of service at retirement, the service retirement benefit is higher than the disability retirement benefit. Your estimated

Mr. Mangalathil submitted disability retirement application, two years after he service retired.

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monthly service retirement benefit will be \$2,359.07. Your estimated monthly disability

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retirement benefit will be \$2,358.35.

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Since there is no advantage to a disability retirement with CalPERS, you will

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continue to receive your service retirement benefit.

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If you still wish to pursue disability retirement, please contact us within 30 days.

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Thomas reapplied for disability pension instead of service pension, which was again

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denied on Dec 24, 2021, by CALPERS stating that: The evidence suggests you had knowledge of the application process and, therefore, we are unable to establish that a correctable mistake was

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made.

As Board has power to correct the errors and omissions of any active or retired member,

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Mr. Mangalathil pleads to this board to exercise its discretion and upon any terms it deems just.

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II. Dispute

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The work history and disability are not a matter of dispute here. On 9/13/2019 and

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9/16/2019, CALPERS received a Physical Requirements of Occupation Title/Position form, job

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duty statement, and a Physician's Report on Disability dated 9/13/19 from Konrad NG, M.D.

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indicating that Thomas was substantially incapacitated on a permanent basis.

STATEMENT OF ISSUES - THOMAS J. MANGALATHIL - 1

The real dispute is that Thomas wants disability pension, despite the Agencies calculation and difference of only 72 cents. [Your estimated monthly service retirement benefit will be \$2,359.07. Your estimated monthly disability retirement benefit will be \$2,358.35.] [See attached Exb 26 A307 non-beneficial letter dated Aug 11, 2021.]

Mr. Mangalathil received email on 10/11/2022 and was able to access evidence submitted by Calpers. The supplemental issues raised here is for Exb 3, Exb 15 and Exb16.

Customer Touch Point Report Exb 3 page 5, has notes from staff, which mentions mailing of letters on 08/11/2021:

"closing application DR is not beneficial to member"

"the not beneficial letter mailed to the member"

CalPERS is ignoring the fact of wrong denial of disability pension on by this non-beneficial letter dated Aug 11, 2021 and ignoring the fact that Thomas still wants this Disability pension.

Ignoring the previous timely application, by letter dated December 23, 2021, CalPERS refused to accept respondent's application for disability retirement, by stating that it was untimely.

III. Statement Of Facts

- Mr. Thomas Mangalathil worked as a Psychiatric Technician at the California Medical
 Facility for about 19 years Mr. Mangalathil over the years was forced to push heavy
 medication carts, and he suffered low back pain in association with that work.
- 2. In addition to other previous injuries,
 - a. on 08/15/2017, he fell from a chair which rolled on castors, experiencing notable back pain.
 - b. on 08/23/2017, during work activities pushing medication cart, his back pain became so severe that he needed to seek medical attention.
- 3. These injuries necessitated his excuse from work, and he was later declared unfit to resume duties.

- 4. Mr. Mangalathil was informed he may file for service retirement. He has about 19 years of service.
- 5. He was informed that a disability retirement case is a process that takes time to get a decision. It may get denied, then he needs to appeal and that may take months.
- 6. In 2019, before his retirement, he came to the CALPERS Regional office, and He asked the option.
- 7. CALPERS informed him he can file for Service Retirement and collect my service retirement money and gather all the documents, then file for Disability retirement Election Application.
- 8. CALPERS told him he can file any time.
- 9. Filing by himself was very overwhelming and stressful and may cause a lot of money so I decided to file himself.
- 10. The pandemic Covid-19 and my mental and emotional status was affected my memory was also affected due to the Trauma.
- 11. On September 3,2019 I called the CalPERS office and requested a copy of the booklet. Few days later I received the book.
- 12. On September 5, 2019, I applied for service retirement allowance estimate request for service retirement and disability retirement at CalPERS.
- 13. On September 9,2019 CalPERS acknowledged the receipt of service retirement application and informed I am entitled to a disability retirement.
 - a. CalPERS staff informed about the delay in receiving the disability retirement application and its lengthy submitting procedure.
 - b. I was not well informed, and I didn't get any help from anybody like the workmen's Lawyer or union rep.
 - c. I followed instructions of CalPERS staff in filing and filing application.
 - d. CalPERS staff never informed me that Disability retirement application submission have a deadline.
 - e. CalPERS staff told me I can file any time.

14. On Sept 9, 2019, I am retired for service retirement, effective August 14,2019.

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IV. Mr. Mangalathil is disabled

Section 22126, defines disability as

"any medically determinable physical or mental impairment that is permanent or that can be expected to last continuously for at least 12 months, measured from the onset of the disability, but no earlier than the day following the last day of actual performance of service that prevents a member from performing the member's usual duties for the member's employer, the member's usual duties for the member's employer with reasonable modifications, or the duties of a comparable level position for which the member is qualified or can become qualified within a reasonable period of time by education, training, or experience."

CALPERS received a Physical Requirements of Occupation Title/Position form, job duty statement, and a Physician's Report on Disability dated 9/13/19 from Konrad NG, M.D. indicating you were substantially incapacitated on a permanent basis.

Therefore, here Mr. Mangalathil is a disabled person.

V. Medical Qualifications for Disability Retirement

If the member cannot substantially perform the duties of the position, then he or she is disabled for CalPERS retirement purposes; otherwise, the member is not disabled. A CalPERS disability retirement must be based upon an actual and present (not prospective) inability to substantially perform the member's actual and usual job duties. Furthermore, prophylactic restrictions are not a basis for a disability retirement. If a disability is not currently present but just may occur in the future, the member is presently ineligible for a CalPERS disability retirement.

Here Mr. Mangalathil who suffers with physical and mental disability is eligible for CalPERS disability retirement.

Here, CALPERS ignored all the substantial evidence presented by Mr. Thomas, which is relevant, reasonable, and credible evidence. Evidence that a reasonable disabled person might present.

VI. COVID-19 Pandemic

The pandemic Covid-19 and my mental and emotional status was affected my memory was also affected due to the Trauma.

In a short period of time, COVID-19 rapidly spread throughout California, necessitating updated and more stringent guidance from federal, state, and local public health official.

On March 4, 2020, California Governor proclaimed a State of Emergency to exist in California as a result of the threat of COVID-19 [Executive Order N-33-20.] https://covid19.ca.gov/img/Executive-Order-N-33-20.pdf

Due to COVID restrictions, safety protocols, CDC guidelines, of people to keep safe distances from one another, to reduce the number of infections and ease the strain on overwhelmed local health systems, Thomas was not able to file this application on time.

VII. Conclusion

Thomas requests this Board of Administration California Public Employees' Retirement System, to uses its inherent powers and kindly condone the delay.

[Your estimated monthly service retirement benefit will be \$2,359.07. Your estimated monthly disability retirement benefit will be \$2,358.35.] [See attached Exb 26 A307 non-beneficial letter dated Aug 11, 2021.]

Even if both calculations are same, Thomas would still prefer to receive disabled pension.

Thomas may be able to receive other benefits once Thomas is declared a disabled person by

CalPERS

Thomas requests this Board of Administration California Public Employees' Retirement System, to uses its inherent powers and kindly approve the disabled pension.

Dear Thomas J Mangalathil,

We have received your disability retirement application with an effective date of August 14, 2019. After careful review, we have determined CalPERS would provide no additional monetary, tax or health vesting benefit if you were approved for disability retirement.

We have determined, based on your age and years of service at retirement, the service retirement benefit is higher than the disability retirement benefit. Your estimated monthly service retirement benefit will be \$2,359.07. Your estimated monthly disability retirement benefit will be \$2,358.35.

There is no tax advantage to receiving a non-industrial disability retirement. The only "tax exempt" pension that we report to the tax authorities is the industrial disability retirement benefit, which applies to safety category employees, such as police and firefighters, where the job itself requires risk to their personal safety. We report all non-industrial disability retirement income as ordinary income.

Since there is no advantage to a disability retirement with CalPERS, you will continue to receive your service retirement benefit.
