PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Congratulations to Scott Taylor.

So I want to share that the Board recently kicked off our self-evaluation process. Our Board Governance Policy requires that we assess our performance every two years. And as fiduciaries of the fund, it is imperative that the Board members have the knowledge, skills, and expertise necessary to govern effectively and thereby improve our performance.

The Board's self-assessment provides the opportunity to identify areas for improvement, to enhance the Board's decision-making and oversight. And once again, we are working with the National Association of Corporate Directors to administer the survey.

25 | Questionnaires were sent to all Board members at the end

of October and interviews will be completed later this month. Based on our 2024 meeting schedule, we do expect that the final surveys will be presented in the March meeting. I want to thank my colleagues for their time and attention to this work and I look forward to further strengthening our fund governance.

January is our next set of meetings. This is our last -- this is our last meeting for this year. The subcommittee of the Board conducting the search for the Chief Investment Officer will meet immediately following this meeting. And we will be going over the timelines for the search and the qualities that we're looking for in a candidate. But our next time together is January 16th and 17th for our Board Education Day and our Stakeholder Forum.

But until then, on behalf of the Board, have a Happy Holiday Season and cherish the time that you have with your family and friends.

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And with that, I'm going to turn it over to Ms. Frost.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Okay. We'll give Kathy just a minute --

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Hold on a second, yeah. Okay. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: -- to get set up.

I can go ahead and start the intro. I've got a little bit to talk about before we bring on the slide show.

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So good morning, President Taylor and everyone. It's really -- you know, I'm proud to be with you again today and really very proud to share my CEO report in a very different manner today. So today I'm going to use my time to talk about the CalPERS workplace culture and to highlight our 14th Annual Diversity and Inclusion Day that took place just a few weeks ago.

It was hosted by our CalPERS Diversity Outreach Program. And as you know, an inclusive culture is a driving force behind any organization's success. It's key to recruiting the talent that we need and then more importantly once we get that talent, we need to make sure that we're able to retain them. It helps with engagement. It helps with outperformance, creativity, and innovation.

That's really why we hold special events like the Annual Diversity and Inclusion Day to raise the team's awareness about the people they work with and to strengthen those relationships. The more we learn about one another's cultures, our backgrounds, and our abilities, the more connected we become. And connected teams do produce positive outcomes for our members we serve, the people who we are working with, and those we do

business with.

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So go ahead, Kathy, and let's bring up the slides.

(Thereupon a slide presentation).

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: So this was our First D&I day in person since 2019. It's a tradition that our team members greatly enjoy and often tout as an example of why CalPERS is a special place to work. It tells the story of who we are, unique and vibrant in all of our diversity.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: We had 20 teams showcasing their heritage from all around the world. Just about every continent was represented from the Hmong in Asia shown here in traditional clothing --

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: -- to countries south of the equator and everywhere in between, including Peru in the foreground and New Zealand in the background.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Each team found creative ways to educate our team members about their culture using creative games and interactive poster boards, such as this one representing fun facts about Canada. The Canada booth was very popular based on the

food they were serving.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Norway. about cultural history, cooking, and art forms were also on full display. By visiting the Norway exhibit, you could learn about Viking heritage, Norwegian cooking, historical attire, and the art of painting plates.

And, of course, there's no better way to experience different cultures than by traveling. Also included were a few exhibits that encouraged active participation, for example, a poster board prompting people to share where they have traveled and another prompting people to place an arrow on a world map indicating where their families originated from.

And as you can see, our team's family stories stretch across the globe.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Not coincidentally, the world map was next to one team's booth that featured their diverse roots ranging from China, Vietnam, India, the Yucatán region of Mexico and Nigeria.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: And we can't forget those who served our country through the U.S. armed forces. As you heard from President Taylor's report,

veterans are an important part of the CalPERS culture.

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Who better to understand the call to service that we have at CalPERS than those who have put their life on the lines for our country. We're grateful for their service and to our members as well. Behind the scenes of many of DEI activities on campus are a group of volunteers that make up our employee resource groups. They include the Diversity and Inclusion Group and the Disability Advisory Council. They meet year-round to facilitate wide-ranging DEI discussions and support the work of our CalPERS diversity outreach program.

Not pictured, but also important to mention is the Emergency Response Team who came to spread awareness about the need for inclusive assistance during emergency evacuation to meet the needs of all people, especially those with mobility needs or other special needs.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Walking through the atrium, you saw unique cultural artifacts everywhere shown here from Laos, India, And Africa. Musical instruments, works of art, figurines, jewelry, the variety was really endless.

The Brazil exhibit offered another vivid example of the artifacts and traditions that make that country so unique. As a country that borders almost all other

countries in South America, Brazil is a rich mixture of art, food, and traditions. You can also sample food and beverages from the many countries represented.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: St. Lucia, an island in the Caribbean, shared a traditional cinnamon spice drink that they serve during the holidays. It was suite, a little spicy, and very popular.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: A visit to the Vietnam booth offered samples of Vietnamese coffee, sweet and creamy contrasted by a salty favorite shrimp chips.

Participants complimented the food selections in the survey wanting more of the food experience the next time we get together. An online recipe book has been created on our internal website for those who want to recreate their favorite dishes at home.

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Went, team members hosting exhibits were full of joy, proud to share their culture, and to answer questions and visit with everyone who walked by. The same joy could be seen on the faces of the approximate 300 people our team members in attendance who were happy to have in-person events again and to see colleagues from other areas of the

organization that they don't really get to interact with on a daily basis. These opportunities to connect are relished and it really is a hallmark of our culture.

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In addition to the many cultural exhibits, we had several that were oriented to the identities and causes that we care so much about. In this case, the purpose was to deepen our understanding of LGBTQ+ culture and provide activities to help advance equity.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: For example, the Pride booth engaged visitors with the concept of intersectionality, by encouraging team members to have open dialogue with one another to find the commonalities and not the differences.

Let's go ahead and move.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Yep.

The disability and technology exhibit showcased the important work being done to ensure that people of all abilities are accommodated and can be successful in their jobs or roles. They displayed screen reader assistive technology shown here with closed captioning, American Sign Language handouts, and items such as braille labels and a large key high contrast keyboard to support the sight impaired or hearing-impaired.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Given that one in four adults in the U.S. has a disability of some kind, these devices and technologies are useful resources to help us not only support our current workforce, but also to recruit our new talent.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: Another important issue on display was advocating for equal opportunities. The Allies of Affirmative Action exhibit shared compelling resources, including a recommended reading list to illustrate just how much issue of race -- or issues of race still impact our society today. They shared Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson's dissenting opinion from a recent Supreme Court decision as an example of the ongoing work needed to advance equality in the country. Visitors were challenged to read, to share, and to discuss issues of equality with their friends and their colleagues.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: As is tradition, we were treated to several musical and dance performances. This year's entertainment features -- featured dancers representing the traditions of Mexico, and India, along with musicians sharing traditional song from India, and original music by a Barbadian singer, song writer, a local

person we were able to invite to the event and he was able to clear his schedule.

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CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FROST: I think the smiles say it all. D&I Day was a success all around. Considering that so much of our work requires us to interact with others, the annual D&I days serves as an important purpose to support our inclusive culture, built on mutual respect, trust, and understanding among colleagues and to confirm that each and every team member belongs here at CalPERS. Employees who feel they belong are more inspired to engage with the mission of the organization and with one another.

As I close, I'll share a quick video recap -there's no music to this one -- while I thank our teams,
including the CalPERS Diversity Outreach Program, the
Office of Public Affairs, the Operations Support Services,
and our Event Management for all of their work to make the
14th Annual D&I Day event so successful.

When you have a chance, I do encourage you to visit the D&I Day displays that out here in -- just outside of the auditorium. And this will take just maybe another half a minute to get through.

But that does conclude my CEO report. I'm happy to take any questions about the day or any other questions

that you may have.

And Agenda Item 5c, emerging and diverse manager reports to the Legislature required by AB 890.

The Quarterly Chief Investment Officer report; mid-cycle Public Employees' Retirement Fund asset liability management review; total fund portfolio

management annual program review; CalPERS Sustainable

Investments 2030 Strategy; Responsible Contractor Policy
annual review; and consultant review of CalPERS
divestments.

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The Chair directed staff to: provide an update to the Board regarding engagement efforts on issues heard in public comment; provide an update on the implementation of labor principles at the June 2024 Investment Committee meeting; provide that the final emerging and diverse manager report, AB 890, to the Board includes tracking of reported data from prior reports; review the proxy voting principles for potential update as part of the total fund review; and update on the Sustainability 2030 Plan in future updates to reflect various Board comments, including adding a KPI on labor principles.

The Committee heard public comment on the following topics: climate change, labor issues, and management of the total portfolio.

With that, we will move on to 8c. Is it only you, Danny or -- oh, no, it's both of you. So -- and I want to start with we do have some public comments. And if you could go through the presentation, but I think we're of an accord here to do -- pull it back, but go ahead and give us the presentation.

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LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: Sure. Good morning, Madam President and Board members. Danny Brown, Calpers team member. And joining me is Dallas Stone who you know oversees the Election Unit.

Agenda Item 8c is an action item asking for the Board's direction regarding the release of certain voter information to Board candidates during election period. At the April Board meeting, CalPERS team members were directed to draft a legislative proposal that would permit limited access to certain voter information during a Board election in an effort to increase voter turnout.

The PERL currently doesn't allow the release of this type of information. The agenda item provides several legislative options for the Board's consideration and several questions to help guide the decision process. I do want to point out that these options aren't -- you're not limited to these options. And I know one of them recommends that if you do move forward with a leg. proposal, that staff recommends that you don't release

anymore than the name, the city, the employer, and whether or not the person voted.

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Now, of course, you can release less information than that, if you choose. Again, these are just kind of guideposts for you. The agenda item also includes research that we conducted around voter lists, as far as how the Secretary of State handles voter lists and county election offices. We also took a survey of other pension systems to see whether or not they provided any type of voter list and that's included in the item.

If the Board wishes to proceed, the most important questions are what information to release and who should release -- and who should get that information. Once that's decided, you know, that will impact the processes and the security protocols needed to be set up and any penalties for misuse.

We have discussed this proposal with stakeholders and it's safe to say that we've had mixed feedback. While some of them see the value of providing this information as part of the democratic process, there's also that -- folks that are concerned about releasing any type of personal information. So it is important that the benefit of any legislative proposal to release voter information is weighed against the privacy concerns of our CalPERS members.

And with that, I'm happy to take any questions or any direction from the Board.

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PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Okay. So a couple of things. I think that we have a lot of concern around the privacy issues. So as little information as possible. I think also highlighting the Secretary of State's and regular voter information in here made everybody think that's the information that was going to go out, which I think we would like to -- I'm going to have a question over -- from Mr. Palkki. I think we will -- would like to have this reviewed further, but I'll have -- I also have a question from Ms. Walker, but first Mr. Palkki.

BOARD MEMBER PALKKI: Hi. Thank you so much.

I -- just to go on record. I don't say much and hopefully what I have to ask is -- has some weight to it. But this is something that weighed on my shoulders since 3 a.m. this morning.

So because of the recent issues over the summer here, is there any perceived risk if we were to move forward with this information being released, things like that, or is there any risk to CalPERS?

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: I mean, I think there's always risk, and I don't know if the Legal Office wants to jump in, but I think the risk obviously depends on the amount of information that's

given. I think the amount of information that we recommended that you at least limit it to reduces some of that risk. You know, the risk is probably more reputational in the event that a candidate misuses the information. And the amount of information again that we recommended, it's probably, I think, the most — the name and the employer is already out there. So the new information would be whether or not someone voted and the city. And, of course, the more information you have, the more someone could go on Google or online and find things. But I think, you know, there is always risk anytime we give information to a third party.

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BOARD MEMBER PALKKI: Okay. And then also, I was reading through the information, and there's the California Public Records Act that excludes certain officer's members, including judges, peace officers, and appointed elected officials. Would this circumvent that rule or would that rule still stay in place?

think it's -- I think it's depending on how we draft the language. I mean, we can give folks an opt-out or we can say that these particular folks' information would not be shared.

BOARD MEMBER PALKKI: Okay. And then again would -- if this was like moved forward or approved, would

members -- CalPERS members be able to opt out of this possibility?

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: If that's the Board's direction, that would be our recommendation is to provide an opt-out -- the ability for members to opt out.

BOARD MEMBER PALKKI: Okay. You know, just to sort of conclude here my questions. There's a lot of concern amongst school employees. And I know firsthand that school employees are asked to put a placard in their vehicle. And when they go home at the end of the day, they remove that placard out of fear that somebody may show up at their work site to harm them. And so as a Board member, it's my belief that we just -- we need to take our due diligence when it comes to our members' information and the security of that information, because sometimes it is their life that is on the line.

So thank you.

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PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you.

So I will also say that I understand that everybody's fears. I think that -- I don't think we should decide this today. But what I think we should do is the least amount of information possible, right, name, employer, and that's it, right? No phone numbers or anything, because I think we can -- we -- that's not

necessary. The main reason I think that we're doing this, and I don't know that you highlighted it or that we're — that we thought about this is because elections are expensive, right? And if you have to run a second election — you know, runoff election, it becomes even more expensive. So it helps to know who voted already, so that you can keep your — what do you call it, circle down, basically. You don't have to send out information to everybody you sent the first time around or if you want to send out information, or call, or whatever during your first election, right? There was a runoff. It helps to know who already voted basically.

The main thing is it's just -- I don't know who's done precinct walking, but we all know that when you're precinct walking, you've got a whole lot of information and you're looking for who voted, right? Okay. Well, so-and-so voted, so I'm skipping this house, so let me go to the next house, right? So we're just looking for that kind of information when -- I think when we're all running our elections. It's helpful and contains costs for the candidates as well.

Ms. Walker.

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BOARD MEMBER WALKER: Madam President, I'd like to make a motion that we pull this item until the next regularly scheduled meeting. And if the motion is

accepted, I'll speak on why.

BOARD MEMBER WALKER: Thank you. I would like to say that the reason that I'm asking to pull this it's -- from calls that I have had, it is apparent to me that there are more conversations that need to be had about this motion on the -- not about the motion, but about the item. On the whole, you know, just getting the name, the agency that they work at, you know, that is I think the most information that you give out, as opposed to, you know, their contact information and everything else.

But whenever you introduce a new concept or something new, it is always easy for people to see all of the things that can go wrong and not necessarily see that this could be a benefit. So I think it would behoove us to have more opportunities to talk it through, before we

actually make a decision on how we proceed.

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PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you, Ms. Walker. I appreciate that.

I have Mr. -- Hold on second. Mr. Pacheco.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: Yes. Thank you. Thank you, President Taylor. And thank you, Mr. Brown, for your information here.

Most of the -- most of the questions I wanted to ask were asked by my distinguished colleagues on the -- on the Board here. But I do have one question that's a little bit -- it's parallel to this. And, you know, you mentioned that one of the risks is the -- is the misuse or the perceived misuse of this voter information, whatever it may be, but very sensitive and private information of our -- of our members may expose CalPERS to litigation.

And I'd like you to just elaborate on that and -because in this world and I -- you know I work in IT. I'm
an IT professional. And when we have a hack or a breach
on ours, it is expensive in the millions of dollars. And,
you know, we've had -- so I'm just curious about that,
because it could be -- if this was -- if this became a -if this was -- if this was misused, it could expose us in
-- to such a great extent. It would be devastating. So
if you can elaborate a little bit about that.

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: Well,

I don't know if we did an analysis on the -- you know, like the fiscal impact. I think when we wrote the concerns was that not so much that, you know, we would miss -- that we would lose the information.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: Right.

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LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: But a we give a -- go out to third parties, if they don't protect it and they get breached, then, you know, the members are likely going to come after us or, you know, sue us for providing the information. Obviously, the least amount of information you give reduces that risk. And since -- if we go down the road of only name and agency, which is information that's already readily available out there, and only provide whether or not someone is voting -- whether or not someone is voting is probably not something that someone can use to, you know, steal someone's identity or use it in a way to impact a member negatively, at least financially.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: So and I will say that this was not on the motion.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: No. I was just asking the --

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: I understand. So we're getting ready to vote on the motion.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: Sure. Sure.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: So if you want to hold further questions. I do have -- before we vote on the motion, I'd like to call our public commenters.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: Sure.

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PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Martha Penry, Cassie Mancini,
Tim Behrens, and Jerry Fountain, if you all want to come
up here and -- I think three of you can -- oh, no, four of
you can sit there. There you go.

And go ahead. You will have three minutes to start.

MARTHA PENRY: Thank you so much. I'm Martha
Penry. Today, I'm here representing 12,000 school
retirees and today our active school members as well who
have Calpers. I'm speaking on their behalf.

Since this item was agendized, I've had so many calls and emails about releasing private, confidential information. By releasing the names and contact information, employer or former employer name or any other details about the member empowers scammer's ability to obtain confidential information. The confidence in CalPERS to keep our information safe has been rattled by the data breach. Everyone's aware of that. Even Mr. Brown admits that another third party having this information, nothing's going to prevent them from having another breach.

Releasing info -- additional information in the voting process reduces the retirees' and members' confidence in CalPERS and your ability to keep our information confidential. If you or a family member have been subjected to a scam, you understand it only takes one point of detailed information for a retiree or member to believe the caller. Don't be that source of information.

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By CalPERS providing more information it further opens that door for a potential group of scammers to ask for the list and open our members to harm. I have been hit several times. Thank God that you put Experian in place or Life Lock, whatever, but I've been hit.

So I want you to understand how we feel about it and ask that you definitely reach out and let's have a conversation. Thank you.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Appreciate that. Thank you. Go ahead. Cassie.

CASSIE MANCINI: Hi. Good morning. Cassie

Mancini with the California School Employees Association.

I first wanted to thank the Board for considering the motion before you to defer this to your January meeting.

CSEA is supportive of that motion to give us the time to have these initial conversations. As Ms. Penry said, especially in the aftermath of the data breach, our retirees are supremely concerned about their data

security. So we really do need this time to have those conversations, to really examine how releasing more personal information that could be used by scammers to target not just our retirees, but also other CalPERS members, how that's going to be monitored and protected against.

We especially think that it's important for the CalPERS Board to fully consider how unauthorized uses of this file will be monitored, what will the penalties be for misuse of this information, and who's going to be in charge with enforcing those penalties. We think that these questions and further stakeholder conversations should really have clear answers before CalPERS sponsors this legislation. So thank you again for really thoughtfully considering this proposal. Appreciate your time.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you very much.

Mr. Behrens. Did I lose him?

Oh, there he is.

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TIM BEHRENS: President Taylor, members of the Board, Tim Behrens, California State Retirees. Thanking Yvonne Walker, Board member, who represents the retirees for making this motion and for Board Member Pacheco for bringing up the data breach.

We value our privacy. We believe that CalPERS

dodged a bullet on this data breach that occurred not long ago - I hope it's still in your memory - by having a third party responsible for that. We were not satisfied with that outcome, two years of coverage is not enough, because the people out there sitting in their bath robes, drinking a cup of coffee looking for a way to scam us, is not going to go away in two years. And they not only have our names, they have our Social Security numbers. So it's important for you to think through this.

Even though Danny talked about risk, I think you all should talk about more risk. So please support this -- don't support this legislation in moving it forward. And thank you for your time.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you.

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Mr. Fountain -- or Fountain. I'm sorry.

MR. FOUNTAIN: Good morning, Board members. I appreciate this opportunity to speak with you. And that correction to my last name is a very common correction, so don't let it bother you.

I speak against this as it's presented and thank you for the amendment. Retirees are a very fragile group. And they treasurer their privacy. We've gone through an episode here recently where the information was breached and now we're talking about voluntarily giving it to another third party. And as we all know, during the

election period, every rule is followed and nobody tries to take advantage of anything -- any information given to them.

As this is presented, the only limitation that I heard was just a recommendation not to exceed certain levels of information. That doesn't mean that somebody wouldn't go ahead and do it. If this is to continue, this form needs to be strengthened, because you can't walk back once you release information that shouldn't be released. The damage has already been done and there's no correcting it.

So give it some strong thought. Revise this.

Put in some strong controlling language and possibly the retirees will appreciate that.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you, Jerry.

So Danny, I think also direction from the Chair is just to make sure that we don't -- if we bring like the language that says just the name and the employer, and if they voted or not, you -- if you want to give us a choice, add one more thing or take away something. But I think we should have, if -- when you bring it back, we should have specific language with a de minimis amount, very small amount, of information that we're asking for. I think the main thing that we want to

see, when those of us who have to run for election, is just whether or not they voted.

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So, I mean, we do need to know which election, right? So if they're -- you know, work for a city or a county versus the State of California, or retirees or something like that, but just try to keep it down, but also make sure that we have some conversations with our stakeholders here. They've made -- voiced some very important concerns and I understand, so...

And I appreciate the direction. I think the -- including what the Secretary of State is doing was not meant to scare anybody, but was meant to provide contrast of what they do versus what we were planning to do. And the legislation would definitely be limited to whatever the Board directs us to limit it to. So it would not be open and give staff discretion to limit it. It would be limited to the items the Board tells us to limit it to.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Yeah. And I don't think the other person talked about -- and I don't know if we can direct you to explore this about holding -- you know, if something is breached holding people accountable. I don't know that we have the ability to do that, but if you want to explore something like that.

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: We'll

look at that. I mean, the Secretary of State, you know, refers -- they do some initial investigation based on complaints that they get. And depending on what their findings are, then they refer it to the Attorney General's office. So we -- you know, we'll have to look at, you know, that process as far as the complaint process, and who does the initial investigation, and then what happens after that.

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PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Okay. Okay. Any other questions on the motion?

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             LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: Yes.
   This is the State and federal legislative updates.
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             Starting with the State, we are in the interim
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   period between the first and second year of the
    legislative session and the Governor has finished his
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    work. So there's not a lot to report at this time, but
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for those of you who like numbers. In 2023, there were 2,662 bills introduced in the Legislature sent 1,046 of those to the Governor's desk. Of those bills, the Governor signed 890 of them and vetoed 156 for a veto rate of 14.9 percent.

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The Legislative Affairs Division tracked roughly 320 bills, with 20 of those bills being designated at our highest level of attention and analysis. Seven of those bills were signed into law and the remaining 13 actually became two-year bills, so they can be acted upon next year. You can find more details on all of these bills in our written report.

The Legislature is scheduled to reconvene on January 3rd. And there will be an initial flurry of activity, because two-year bills that are still in their house of origin have until the end of the month to get out and move to the second House. After that, the next important date is February 16, which is the last day for new bills to be introduced. So when we meet again in February, we should have a good idea of what's on our plate for the 2024 year.

Now, moving to the federal update. When we met in September, we left wondering if there was going to be a government shutdown. As you know, that didn't happen, but Speaker McCarthy lost his job and three weeks and four

candidates later, Mike Johnson from Louisiana was elected House Speaker and you've probably all read in the paper today that Speaker Johnson looks like he's been able to avoid another possible government shutdown with a short-term funding bill with no budget cuts and help from Democrats. It sounds familiar, but the difference is it looks like he'll get to keep his job.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: For now.

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LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: But kidding aside, I think everyone is happy that a government shutdown was avoided. However, it is just temporarily delaying the showdown between the House and the Senate on the 12 different individual spending bills. And one unfortunate impact of this constant focus on funding the government has made it difficult, if not impossible, for bipartisan health legislation aimed at controlling costs to find its way to the floor. And with three weeks left on the congressional calendar this year, we shouldn't expect anything to change.

Moving to some good news, you may have seen that on October 25th, a panel of the Fifth Circuit Federal Court of appeals, upheld the Nasdaq Board Diversity Rule in the face of challenges that it attempts to improperly and unconstitutionally dictate the compensation of corporate boards.

As a reminder, since I know many of you are new to the Board, in December 2020, CalPERS commented in strong support of the proposed rule to advance Board diversity and transparency through a disclosure regime that requires companies listed on the exchange to disclose the race, gender, and sexual orientation of their Board members and have or explain why they don't have at least two diverse Board members, including at least one female Board member and one member who is from the -- an unrepresented minority or identifies as LGBTQ+.

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Although it is possible the Fifth Circuit decision will appealed, we hope this positive ruling opens the door for more company disclosure in this area, especially as we continue to wait for the much anticipated proposed rules from the SEC on human capital management. And then speaking of anticipated rules from the SEC, there is still no clear indication when they will come out with their final rules on climate risk disclosure. It is possible they are being delayed because the California reporting requirements established by SB 253 ended up going further than what the SEC was likely going to do. Right now, our best guess is the SEC will likely come out with something before next April.

We will continue to monitor both of those rules and engage as necessary. And with that, I'll end my

presentation and answer any questions.

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PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Mr. Ruffino then Mr. Pacheco.

ACTING BOARD MEMBER RUFFINO: Thank you, Madam President. I just have a quick question on a federal bill. And I know the CalPERS we have a watch position. This is HR 1156, which is the China Financial Threat Mitigation Act of 2023. And I'm just curious to know whether -- I know we're monitoring that, but what -- would that have an effect on our exposure and our investments in China?

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: I don't think it has an impact. It's because it's more of a reporting bill. I mean, there's a number of bills going through Congress right now around disclosure, not so much prohibiting any type of investments, but they definitely want disclosure of what is going on there, and particularly going after some of the private equity companies, making sure they're disclosing what they're investing in.

ACTING BOARD MEMBER RUFFINO: Okay. Thank you. Thank you, Madam President

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Mr. Pacheco.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: Yeah. Thank you, Madam

President as well and thank you, Mr. Brown, for your

update. I just want to have another update on in similar

lines with Mr. Ruffino. The S2007 bill, the Improving Corporate Governance Through Diversity Act of 2023, I know we are -- we have a sponsor position on that, but I just wanted to know where that is right now, what's the status of that and --

mean, nothing has changed on it. It has not been, you know, set for a hearing. I think -- and again, I think everything is focused on, you know, funding the government. The Senate still has to -- is still working on their appropriations bills. The House, you know, has several appropriation bills that they're still trying to pass before they go on their Christmas break. So I think most of the focus is on that. I think that's something that we're going to have to wait and probably look at engaging on next year when they come back.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: So next year perhaps. Okay.

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIVISION CHIEF BROWN: Yeah.

BOARD MEMBER PACHECO: Thank you very much.

That's all I wanted to know.
