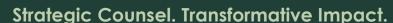

DISABLED VETERAN BUSINESS ENTERPRISE CONTRACT PARTICIPATION

CalPERS Board of Administration requires contract participation from certified Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBEs) in its contract process, unless specifically exempted.  - 3. It is a sole proprietorship, corporation, or partnership with its home office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign based business.

DISABLED VETERAN BUSINESS ENTERPRISE CONTRACT PARTICIPATION

CalPERS Board of Administration requires contract participation from certified Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBEs) in its contract process, unless specifically exempted. Only State of California, Office of Small Business and DVBE Services (OSDS) may certify a DVBE. The DVBE must perform a commercially useful function relevant to this solicitation to be considered compliant with the DVBE program requirements. In order to obtain DVBE incentive participation credit, the contractor must be a certified DVBE or subcontract with a DVBE, certified by OSDS, no later than the Final Filing Date as specified in the Schedule of Events.

Please read the following requirements carefully. Completion of this document is required regardless of intent to pursue DVBE incentive participation.

DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this DVBE incentive participation, the following definitions apply:

Disabled veteran means a veteran of the military, naval, or air services of the United States with a service-connected disability of ten percent or more, who is a resident of the State of California.

DVBE means a business concern certified by OSDS as meeting all of the following:

- 1. A sole proprietorship at least 51 percent owned by one or more disabled veterans; or in the case of a publicly owned business, at least 51 percent of its stock is owned by one or more disabled veterans; a subsidiary which is wholly owned by a parent corporation, but only if at least 51 percent of the voting stock of the parent corporation is owned by one or more disabled veterans; or a joint venture in which at least 51 percent of the joint venture's management and control and earnings are held by one or more disabled veterans.
 - 2. The management and control of the daily business operations are by one or more disabled veterans. The disabled veterans who exercise management and control are not required to be the same disabled veterans as the owners of the business concern.
 - 3. It is a sole proprietorship, corporation, or partnership with its home office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign based business.

Commercially Useful Function A DVBE contractor, subcontractors, or supplier is considered performing a commercially useful function when it meets all of the following criteria:

- 1. The business concern is:
 - (a) Responsible for the execution of a distinct element of the work of the contract;
 - (b) Carries out its obligation by actually performing, managing, or supervising the work involved;
 - (c) Performs work that is normal for its business, services and function; and
- 2. The business concern is not further subcontracting a greater portion of the work that is greater than would be expected by normal industry practices.

A contractor, subcontractor, or supplier will not be considered to perform a commercially useful function if the contractor's, subcontractor's, or supplier's role is limited to that of an extra participant in a transaction, contract, or project through which funds are passed in order to obtain the appearance of small business, microbusiness, or DVBE participation. When subcontracting to small, micro, or DVBE subcontractors, the intent is for the subcontractor to provide goods or services required for the performance of the contract rather than artificial or incidental participation that provides an "appearance" of participation to meet the socio-economic objectives of these programs.

DVBE PARTICIPATION OPTIONS AND DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS

In order to be **responsive** to the incentive participation, bidders will complete and submit Attachment G, Exhibit 1, DVBE Contract Participation and select one of the following options:

Option A – DVBE Incentive. A bidder may submit DVBE participation percentages to receive and qualify for the incentive program. Bids that fail to submit the required form and confirm the level of DVBE participation will not be eligible to receive the DVBE incentive. Refer to RFP, Section V Proposal Requirements, A(8) Technical Proposal/Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise Contract Participation and Incentive.

Option B- No DVBE Incentive Participation. A bidder may opt out of participation in the DVBE incentive program.

USE/SUBSTITUTION OF PROPOSED DVBE

If awarded the contract, the successful bidder must use the DVBE subcontractor and/or supplier proposed in their final bid/proposal unless the contractor requests substitution via prior written notice to CalPERS and CalPERS approves such substitution. At a minimum, the request must include:

- A. A written explanation for the substitution;
- B. The identity of the person or firm substituted;

- C. Any change in the work or dollar/percentage amount caused by the substitution; and
- D. A revised DVBE Contract Participation (Attachment G, Exhibit 1) and applicable certification(s).

The request and CalPERS approval or disapproval of the substitution shall not affect compliance with any other provision of law, or any other contract requirements relating to substitution of subcontractors.

QUESTIONS

The information below is provided to answer commonly asked questions and clarify potential misconceptions of the contract participation goal requirement. Meeting the Goal

- 1. Proposing incentive goal attainment is a <u>commitment</u> to use disabled veteran business enterprises for the established percent of the contract amount. If awarded a contract, CalPERS expects the DVBE subcontractors or suppliers to be utilized as identified in your proposal, unless a substitution is approved by CalPERS.
- 2. An expression of <u>intent</u> to subcontract with unidentified DVBE firms at some future date <u>is insufficient</u> to comply with DVBE incentive participation. Commitments must be finalized upon submission of your contract participation documentation to CalPERS.
- 3. **Out-of-state firms** are <u>not</u> excluded from participating in the DVBE incentive program. To do business with CalPERS, completion of this document is required for all bidders.

Our Federal Home Loan Bank Chicago engagement included development of comprehensive supplier diversity educational content as part of their broader organizational DEI initiative. through inclusive procurement processes, explaining diverse vendor definitions, sourcing procedures, and the business case for supplier diversity. This content emphasized practical implementation strategies including diverse vendor identification, competitive selection processes, and partnership development with diversity councils and certification organizations.

For Bayer Corporation, we developed and implemented a comprehensive supplier diversity spotlight program designed to increase visibility and access for diverse suppliers while raising the profile of Bayer's supplier diversity program within the broader organization. The DVBE must perform a commercially useful function relevant to this solicitation to be considered compliant with the DVBE program requirements. In order to obtain DVBE incentive participation credit, the contractor must be a certified DVBE or subcontract with a DVBE, certified by OSDS, no later than the Final Filing Date as specified in the Schedule of Events.

Please read the following requirements carefully. Completion of this document is required regardless of intent to pursue DVBE incentive participation.

I. DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this DVBE incentive participation, the following definitions apply:

- A. Disabled veteran means a veteran of the military, naval, or air services of the United States with a service-connected disability of ten percent or more, who is a resident of the State of California.
- B. DVBE means a business concern <u>certified by OSDS</u> as meeting all of the following:
 - 1. A sole proprietorship at least 51 percent owned by one or more disabled veterans; or in the case of a publicly owned business, at least 51 percent of its stock is owned by one or more disabled veterans; a subsidiary which is wholly owned by a parent corporation, but only if at least 51 percent of the voting stock of the parent corporation is owned by one or more disabled veterans; or a joint venture in which at least 51 percent of the joint venture's management and control and earnings are held by one or more disabled veterans.
 - The management and control of the daily business operations are by one or more disabled veterans. The disabled veterans who exercise management and control are not required to be the same disabled veterans as the owners of the business concern.
 - It is a sole proprietorship, corporation, or partnership with its home office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign based business.

- C. Commercially Useful Function A DVBE contractor, subcontractors, or supplier is considered performing a commercially useful function when it meets all of the following criteria:
 - 1. The business concern is:
 - (a) Responsible for the execution of a distinct element of the work of the contract;
 - (b) Carries out its obligation by actually performing, managing, or supervising the work involved;
 - (c) Performs work that is normal for its business, services and function; and
 - The business concern is not further subcontracting a greater portion of the work that is greater than would be expected by normal industry practices.

A contractor, subcontractor, or supplier will not be considered to perform a commercially useful function if the contractor's, subcontractor's, or supplier's role is limited to that of an extra participant in a transaction, contract, or project through which funds are passed in order to obtain the appearance of small business, microbusiness, or DVBE participation. When subcontracting to small, micro, or DVBE subcontractors, the intent is for the subcontractor to provide goods or services required for the performance of the contract rather than artificial or incidental participation that provides an "appearance" of participation to meet the socio-economic objectives of these programs.

II. DVBE PARTICIPATION OPTIONS AND DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS

In order to be **responsive** to the incentive participation, bidders will complete and submit Attachment G, Exhibit 1, DVBE Contract Participation and select one of the following options:

- A. Option A DVBE Incentive. A bidder may submit DVBE participation percentages to receive and qualify for the incentive program. Bids that fail to submit the required form and confirm the level of DVBE participation will not be eligible to receive the DVBE incentive. - B. <u>Option B- No DVBE Incentive Participation</u>. A bidder may opt out of participation in the DVBE incentive program.

The request and CalPERS approval or disapproval of the substitution shall not affect compliance with any other provision of law, or any other contract requirements relating to substitution of subcontractors.

Meeting the Goal

- Proposing incentive goal attainment is a <u>commitment</u> to use disabled veteran business enterprises for the established percent of the contract amount. If awarded a contract, CalPERS expects the DVBE subcontractors or suppliers to be utilized as identified in your proposal, unless a substitution is approved by CalPERS.
- 2. An expression of <u>intent</u> to subcontract with unidentified DVBE firms at some future date <u>is insufficient</u> to comply with DVBE incentive participation. Commitments must be finalized upon submission of your contract participation documentation to CalPERS.
- Out-of-state firms are not excluded from participating in the DVBE incentive program. To do business with CalPERS, completion of this document is required for all bidders.

OPERATING AGREEMENT FOR NOVA COLLECTIVE LLC

An Illinois Limited Liability Company

THIS OPERATING AGREEMENT is made as of the ___ day of January, 2017 by and among the signatories identified on the signature pages hereto.

1. FORMATION OF COMPANY

Formation of Company. The initial Members hereby agree that the Company shall exist as a Limited Liability Company under and pursuant to the provisions of the Limited Liability Company Act, and agree that the rights, duties, and liabilities of all Members of the Company shall be as provided in the Act, except as otherwise provided herein.

2. NAME

The name of the limited liability company shall be "Nova Collective LLC." The company may, from time to time, as decided upon by the Managers, operate and brand itself under the name "Nova."

3. PURPOSE

The purpose for which the limited liability company is formed is the transaction of any or all lawful business for which Limited Liability Companies may be organized under this Act.

4. REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

The name of the registered agent of the limited liability company shall be Brynne Hovde. The registered office of the limited liability company shall be located at 1137 Wisconsin Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois 60304.

5. PRINCIPAL PLACE OF BUSINESS

The principal place of business of the limited liability company shall be located at 1137 Wisconsin Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois 60304.

6. FILING OF ARTICLES OF ORGANIZATION

The member(s) of the limited liability company shall:

(a) promptly file a duly executed original copy of the Articles of Organization of the limited liability company, together with one or more additional copies thereof as appropriate, with the Secretary of State of Illinois (the "Secretary") and in such other place or places as may be required by law; and

(b) tender and pay all fees, charges and do all other things requisite for the due formation of the limited liability company pursuant to the laws of the State of Illinois.

7. TERM

The limited liability company shall be deemed formed at the time of the filing of the Articles of Organization with the Secretary and shall continue for perpetuity, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the further provisions of these Articles.

8. NAMES OF MEMBERS

Members of Company. The names of the initial Members of the Company are set forth on the signature page of this Agreement. Additional Members of the Company hereafter shall be indicated on a separate signature page, as amended or restated from time to time.

9. DESIGNATION OF MANAGERS

For the purpose of conducting the business and affairs of the limited liability company, Brynne Hovde, Tiffany Hudson, and Rebecca Stahl shall act as managers. This Company shall be managed by the Managers.

10. RIGHTS AND POWERS OF THE MANAGERS

10.1 The managers shall have sole and complete control of the management and operation of the affairs and business of the limited liability company.

10.2 In addition to the specific rights and powers herein granted to the managers, the managers shall possess and may enjoy and exercise all of the rights and powers of managers as provided in the Act.

10.3 The limited liability company shall, to the fullest extent permitted by law, indemnity, defend and save harmless the managers and former manager(s) from any and all claims, actions, causes of action, suits, proceedings, losses, damage, liability, costs and expenses (including, without limitation, attorneys' fees and expenses, and court costs) asserted against or incurred or sustained by them by reason of any act performed by them while manager or any omission on their part while manager to act for or in behalf of the limited liability company and in furtherance of its interest provided that the manager(s) acted in good faith and in a manner the manager(s) reasonably believed to be in, or not opposed to, the best interest of the limited liability company and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, had no reason to believe that their conduct was unlawful.

10.4 The managers shall not be liable for any mistakes in judgment or for any inadvertent failure to perform any of its obligations hereunder, or for any loss due to such mistake or failure to perform, or due to the negligence, dishonesty, fraud or bad faith of any employee or other agent of the limited liability company.

10.5 Unless not required by applicable law, the identification "LLC" shall appear after the name of the limited liability company on all correspondence, stationery, checks, invoices and any and all documents and papers executed by the limited liability company.

10.6 In the absence of either manager, Power of Attorney may be used to conduct any and all affairs and business of the limited liability company.

11. MEETING OF MEMBERS

- 11.1 Meetings. Meetings of the Members of the Company as a whole, for any purpose or purposes, may be called by any Member or Members of the Company.
- 11.2 Place of Meetings. The Members may designate any place, either within or outside the State of Illinois, as the place of meeting for any meeting of the Members. If a designation is not made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of meeting shall be the principal place of business of the Company.
- 11.3 Notice of Meetings. Except as provided in Section 11.4, written notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting and the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called shall be delivered not less than five nor more than thirty days before the date of the meeting, either personally, by mail or by electronic mail, by or at the direction of the Members or Member calling the meeting, to each Member entitled to vote at such meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered two calendar days after being deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the Member at its address as it appears on the books of the Company, with postage thereon prepaid.
- 11.4 Meeting of All Members. If all the Members associated with a Series shall meet at any time and place, either within or outside the State of Illinois, or participate in a teleconference meeting, and consent to the holding of a meeting at such time and place or by teleconference, such meeting shall be valid without call or notice, and at such meeting lawful action may be taken.
- 11.5 Record Date. For the purpose of determining Members entitled to notice of or to vote at any meeting of Members or any adjournment thereof, or Members entitled to receive payment of any distribution, or in order to make a determination of Members for any other purpose, the day immediately prior to the date on which notice of the meeting is mailed or the day immediately prior to the date on which the resolution declaring such distribution is adopted, as the case may be, shall be the record date for such determination of Members. When a determination of Members entitled to vote at any meeting of Members has been made as provided in this Section 11.5, such determination shall apply to any adjournment thereof.
- 11.6 Quorum. Members holding at least sixty percent of all Percentage Interests of the Company as a whole, represented in person or by proxy, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of Members of the Company as a whole. In the absence of a quorum at any such meeting, Members holding a majority of the Percentage Interests so represented may adjourn the meeting from time to time for a period not to exceed sixty days without further notice. However, if the adjournment is for more than sixty days, or if after the adjournment a new record date is fixed for the adjourned meeting, a notice of the adjourned meeting shall be given to each Member of record entitled to vote at the meeting. At such adjourned meeting at which a quorum shall be present or represented, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally noticed. The Members present at a duly organized meeting may continue to transact business until adjournment, notwithstanding the withdrawal during such meeting of that number of Percentage Interests whose absence would cause less than a quorum.

- 11.7 Manner of Acting. If a quorum is present, the affirmative vote of Members holding a Majority Interest in such Series shall be the act of the Members, unless the vote of a greater or lesser proportion or number is otherwise required by the Act or expressly by this Agreement. Only Members associated with a Series may vote or consent upon any matter, and their vote or consent, as the case may be, shall be counted in the determination of whether the matter was approved by the Members associated with a meeting of a Series.
- 11.8 Proxies. At all meetings of Members, a Member may vote in person or by proxy executed in writing by the Member or by a duly authorized attorney-in-fact. Such proxy shall be filed with the Managers associated with the meeting before or at the tune of the meeting. No proxy shall be valid after eleven months from the date of its execution, unless otherwise provided in the proxy. A proxy may only be given verbally during a meeting taking place by teleconferencing and shall expire at the termination of said teleconference.
- 11.9 Action by Members without a Meeting. Action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of Members associated with a Series may be taken without a meeting and without prior notice if written consents of Members associated with such Series are received representing the minimum number of votes that would be necessary to authorize or take such action at a meeting at which all Members of such Series were present and voted.
- 11.10 Waiver of Notice. When any notice is required to be given to any Member, a waiver thereof in writing signed by the Member entitled to such notice, whether before, at, or after the time stated therein, or the participation in a teleconference meeting, shall be equivalent to the giving of such notice.

12. CAPITAL CONTRIBUTIONS AND ACCOUNTS

- 12.1 Initial Loans. Each original Managing Member to this Agreement shall make an initial loan to the Company in accordance with Exhibit B, at the time of each Manager's execution of this Agreement. These initial loans shall be repaid by the Company upon such date that the Company reaches a positive cash flow.
- 12.2 Additional Contributions. If, at any time or times hereafter, the Managers shall determine that additional capital is required by the Company, the Managers shall determine the amount of such additional capital and the anticipated time such additional capital will be required or whether such additional capital shall be provided by the Members by way of additional Capital Contributions or by way of loans from Members. No Member shall be obligated, at any time, to guarantee or otherwise assume or become liable for any obligations of the Company or to make any additional Capital Contributions advances or loans to the Company, unless such obligations are specifically accepted and agreed to by such Member.

13. ALLOCATIONS AND DISTRIBUTIONS

- 13.1 Allocations of Profits and Losses. Profits and Losses, after deducting Guaranteed Payments, shall be allocated among the Members in proportion to their Percentage Ownership Interests. Any special allocations necessary to comply with the requirements set forth in Internal Revenue Code Section 704 and the corresponding Regulations, including, without limitation, the qualified income offset and minimum gain chargeback provisions contained therein, shall be made if the Managers deem these actions to be appropriate.
- 13.2 Distributions. Subject to applicable law and any limitations elsewhere in this Agreement, the Managers shall determine the amount and timing of all distributions of cash, or other assets, by the Company. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, all distributions shall be made to all of the Members, to be decided by vote of the Managers on an annual basis. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, the decision as to whether to make distributions shall be within the sole discretion of the Managers.

All such distributions shall be made only to the Members who, according to the books and records of the Company, are the holders of record on the actual date of distribution. The Managers may base a determination that a distribution of cash may be made on a balance sheet, profit and loss statement, cash flow statement of the Company, or other relevant information. Neither the Company nor the Members shall incur any liability for making distributions.

13.3 Form of Distribution. No Member has the right to demand and receive any distribution from the Company in any form other than money. No Member may be compelled to accept from the Company a distribution of any asset in kind in lieu of a proportionate distribution of money being made to other Members except on the dissolution and winding up of the Company.

14. ACCOUNTING, RECORDS AND REPORTING

14.1 Books and Records. The Company shall maintain complete and accurate accounts in proper books of all transactions of or on behalf of the Company and shall enter or cause to be entered therein a full and accurate account of all transactions on behalf of the Company. The Company's books and accounting records shall be kept in accordance with such accounting principles (which shall be consistently applied throughout each accounting period) as the Managers may determine to be convenient and advisable. The Company shall maintain at its principal office all of the following:

A current list of the full name and last known business or residence address of each Member in the Company set forth in alphabetical order, including entries to these accounts for contributions and distributions; the Ownership Interest, Percentage Ownership and Voting Interests; a copy of the Certificate and any and all amendments thereto together with executed copies of any powers of attorney pursuant to which the Certificate or any amendments thereto have been executed; copies of the Company's federal, state and local income tax or information returns and reports, if any, for the six most recent taxable years; a copy of this Agreement and any and all amendments hereto together with executed copies of any powers of attorney pursuant to which this Agreement or any amendments thereto have been executed; copies of the financial statements of the Company, if any, for the six most recent Fiscal Years; the Company's

books and records as they relate to the internal affairs of the Company for at least the current and past four Fiscal Years; true and full information regarding the status of the business and financial condition of the Company; and true and full information regarding the amount of cash and a description and statement of the agreed value of any other property or services contributed by each Member and which each Member has agreed to contribute in the future, and the date on which each became a Member.

- 14.2 Inspection of Books and Records. Each Member has the right, on reasonable request for purposes reasonably related to the interest of the person as a Member or a Manager, to: (a) inspect and copy during normal business hours any of the Company's records described in Section 7.1; and (b) obtain from the Company promptly after their becoming available a copy of the Company's federal, state and local income tax or information returns for each Fiscal Year.
- 14.3 Accountings. As soon as is reasonably practicable after the close of each Fiscal Year, the Managers shall make or cause to be made a full and accurate accounting of the affairs of the Company as of the close of that Fiscal Year and shall prepare or cause to be prepared a balance sheet as of the end of such Fiscal Year, a profit and loss statement for that Fiscal Year and a statement of Members' equity showing the respective Capital Accounts of the Members as of the close of such Fiscal Year and the distributions, if any, to Members during such Fiscal Year, and any other statements and information necessary for a complete and fair presentation of the financial condition of the Company, all of which the Manager shall furnish to each Member. In addition, the Company shall furnish to each Member information regarding the Company necessary for such Member to complete such Member's federal and state income tax returns. The Company shall also furnish a copy of the Company's tax returns to any Member requesting the same. On such accounting being made, profits and losses during such Fiscal Year shall be ascertained and credited or debited, as the case may be, in the books of account of the Company to the respective Members as herein provided.
- 14.4 Filings. The Managers, at Company expense, shall cause the income tax returns for the Company to be prepared and timely filed with the appropriate authorities. The Managers, at Company expense, shall also cause to be prepared and timely filed with appropriate federal and state regulatory and administrative bodies amendments to, or restatements of, the Certificate and all reports required to be filed by the Company with those entities under the Act or other then current applicable laws, rules, and regulations. If the Company is required by the Act to execute or file any document and fails, after demand, to do so within a reasonable period of time or refuses to do so, any Member may prepare, execute and file that document with the Illinois Secretary of State.
- 14.5 Bank Accounts. The Company shall maintain its funds in one or more separate bank accounts in the name of the Company, and shall not permit the funds of the Company to be co-mingled in any fashion with the funds of any other Person.
- 14.6 Tax Matters Partner. The Managers may, in their exclusive discretion, appoint, remove and replace a Tax Matters Partner at any time or times. The Managers shall from time to time cause the Company to make such tax elections as they deem to be in the interests of the Company and the Members generally. The Tax Matters Partner, as defined in Internal Revenue Code Section 6231, shall represent the Company (at the Company's expense) in connection with all examinations of the Company's affairs by tax authorities, including resulting judicial and administrative proceedings, and shall expend the Company funds for professional services and costs associated therewith.

15. LEGAL TITLE TO PROPERTY

Legal title to all or any portion of the property of the limited liability company shall be held in the name of "Nova Collective LLC" or, to the extent allowed by the Act, in such other name as the managers, in their sole discretion, shall determine to be in the best interest of the limited liability company. Without limiting the foregoing grant of authority, to the extent permitted by the Act, the manager may arrange to have title taken and held in its own name or in the names of trustees, nominees or straw parties for the limited liability company. It is expressly understood and agreed that the manner of holding title to the property (or any part thereof) of the limited liability company is solely for the convenience of the limited liability company, and that all such property shall be treated as property of the limited liability company, subject to the terms of these Articles.

16. DISSOLUTION

- 16.1 The limited liability company shall be dissolved upon the occurrence of any of the following events:
 - (a) when the period fixed for the duration of the limited liability company shall expire;
 - (b) by the unanimous agreement of all members, which shall be in writing;
 - (c) upon the retirement, resignation, expulsion, bankruptcy, court declaration of incompetence with respect to, or dissolution of, a member or the occurrence of any other event that terminates the continued membership of a manager in the limited liability company, unless within ninety (90) days after such event there are at least two (2) remaining managers and all the remaining managers elect to continue the business of the limited liability company by unanimous agreement; or
- 16.2 As soon as possible following the occurrence of any of the events specified in this Article effecting the dissolution of the limited liability company, the limited liability company shall execute and file, with the Secretary, articles of dissolution in accordance with the Act and in such form as shall be prescribed by the Secretary.
- 16.3 Upon a dissolution of the limited liability company, the assets thereof shall be liquidated, and the proceeds therefrom, together with assets distributed in kind to the extent sufficient therefor, shall be applied and distributed in order of priority as follows:
 - (a) First, to creditors of the limited liability company, including members who are creditors, in the order of priority provided by law, in satisfaction of liabilities of the limited liability company other than liabilities for distribution to members under the Act;
 - (b) Second, to members of the limited liability company in respect of their share of the profits and other compensation by way of income on their contributions; and
 - (c) Third, to members of the limited liability company in respect to their contributions of capital
- 16.4 The manager of the limited liability company shall not be personally liable for the return or repayment of all or any portion of the contributions of any member; any such return or repayment shall be made solely from assets of the limited liability company.

17. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 17.1 Unless otherwise provided in these Articles, no member shall be liable to any other member or to the limited liability company for any good faith act or omission to act in the exercise of his or her judgment under the provisions of these Articles.
- 17.2 Nothing herein contained shall be construed to constitute any member hereof the agent of any other member or to limit in any manner the members in the carrying on of their own respective business or activities.
- 17.3 The use of any gender herein shall be deemed to be or include the other genders, and the use of the singular herein shall be deemed to be or include the plural (and vice versa), wherever appropriate. The headings herein are inserted only as a matter of convenience and reference, and in no way define, limit or describe the scope of these Articles, or the intent of any provisions thereof.
- 17.4 These Articles set forth all (and are intended by all parties hereto to be an integration of all) of the covenants, promises, agreements, warranties and representations among the parties hereto with respect to the limited liability company, the business of the limited liability company and the property of the limited liability company, and there are no covenants, promises, agreements, warranties or representations, oral and written, express or implied, among them other than as set forth herein.
- 17.5 Nothing contained in these Articles shall be construed as requiring the commission by any person of any act contrary to applicable law, including, without limitation, Section 4975 of the Code (to the extent applicable). Wherever there is any conflict between any provision of these Articles and any statute, law, ordinance or regulation contrary to which the parties have no legal right to contract, the latter shall prevail, but in such manner that the provision(s) of these Articles thus affected shall be curtailed and limited only to the extent necessary to conform with said requirement of law. In the event that any part, section, paragraph or clause of these Articles shall be held to be indefinite, invalid or otherwise unenforceable, the entire Articles shall not fail on account thereof, and the balance of the Articles shall continue in full force and effect.
- 17.6 The limited liability company shall indemnity, defend and save harmless each member or former member of the limited liability company against expenses actually and reasonably incurred by him, her or it in connection with the defense of an action, suit or proceeding, civil or criminal, in which he, she or it is made a party by reason of being or having been such member except in relation to matters as to which he, she or it shall be adjudged in the action, suit or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct.

18. GOVERNING LAW

It is the intention of the parties hereto that these Articles shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the internal laws of the State of Illinois.

19. BURDEN AND BENEFIT

These Articles are binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective heirs, guardians, executors, administrators, personal and legal representatives, and successors and to the assigns of the parties hereto to the extent, but

only to the extent, the same is provided for in accordance with, and permitted by, the provisions of these Articles.

20. NOTICES

Except as otherwise provided in these Articles, any notice, consent or other communication required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be addressed, in the case of the limited liability company, to its principal place of business specified in Article 5, in the case of the managers, to its address set forth opposite its signature below, and, in the case of any member, as specified on or to such other address or person as any of the foregoing parties shall furnish to the other parties in writing; and any such communication so addressed shall be deemed to have been given when delivered by hand or on the earlier of actual receipt and three (3) business days after being sent by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, or one (1) business day after being sent by overnight courier, telegram, or cable or on actual receipt after being sent by any means not specified herein.

Conducting assessments of established DEI programs is crucial for ensuring that diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts effectively drive change. We conduct these assessments at the beginning of the project because they help identify strengths, gaps, and areas for improvement within an organization's DEI initiatives. We gather qualitative and quantitative data, including employee and leader feedback, representation metrics, review policies and practices, and program outcomes, to establish a baseline for measuring progress and identifying challenges that may hinder inclusion. Findings from the assessment help us develop culturally relevant and actionable recommendations, designed to enhance DEI practices.

Below are examples of how we approach assessment and report development.

Publicly Traded Global High Tech Engineering Company: We conducted focus groups and interviews with the HR team, employees, and leadership team. We also reviewed employee engagement surveys, recruiting, hiring, and retention practices, company policies, and DEI programs to assess the effectiveness of the company's existing DEI strategy against The Centre for Global Inclusion's Global Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Benchmarks. In addition, we analyzed the job candidate pipeline, hiring trends, workforce demographic data, and retention and promotion data to identify areas where challenges existed in hiring and advancing underrepresented talent.

We developed a report with assessment findings and recommendations to improve leadership commitment to DEI and incorporate DEI best practices into employee development strategies. We developed a plan to enhance the HR team's knowledge of DEI and educate executive

leadership on inclusive leadership. Finally, we presented the assessment findings to the Chief People Officer and HR leadership team.

Publicly traded Global High Tech Engineering Company: The client was experiencing declining participation with its Employee Resource Groups and needed help reinvigorating momentum and company participation in their initiatives. We interviewed Employee Resource Group leaders and researched the best practices for ERGs to evaluate the effectiveness of our current ERG programming. We then developed a report that included assessment findings and recommendations to enhance the effectiveness of ERGs and increase employee participation. We presented the report to the Head of Sustainability and Social Impact.

As a result of the report, key recommendations were implemented, including better alignment of ERG goals with the company's broader business objectives and enhanced support for ERG leadership development. Consequently, employee participation in ERGs increased, and the company experienced improved engagement from underrepresented groups, thereby strengthening the impact of its DEI efforts.

4. Meeting with Boards of Trustees as part of the assessment and information-gathering process.

We understand the Board of Trustees' crucial role in shaping an organization's DEI journey. Therefore, engaging with the board is integral to our assessment and information-gathering process. A successful DEI strategy requires understanding the board's vision, priorities, and commitment to DEI.

Here's how we approach meetings with Boards of Trustees:

These meetings help gather information on policies, practices, and culture from the top, ensuring buy-in and accountability. Engaging leadership in the assessment process also fosters ownership of the resulting recommendations, driving long-term commitment to the changes needed to create a more inclusive and equitable workplace.

Below are examples of how we partner with executive leadership to conduct assessments.

Non-Profit Regional Retailer: Conducted interviews with executive leadership to assess the maturity of the company's commitment and accountability to DEI, DEI practices in talent management practices, supplier diversity, and community engagement against competitors' best practices.

The meetings uncovered key areas where the organization lagged in terms of leadership commitment, talent management, supplier diversity, and community engagement. We met and presented findings to the C-Suite and Board. The findings led to the adoption of new DEI initiatives, including improving the employee experience and expanding supplier diversity programs.

Global Biotech Company: We met and interviewed Legal and Healthcare Compliance senior executives and senior executives within their global partner departments to understand the legal and compliance needs for a five-year corporate strategy and supporting talent and leadership development strategy.

Through interviews with senior legal and healthcare compliance executives and their global partners, insights were gathered that helped align the company's five-year corporate strategy with legal and compliance needs. This process also informed the development of a tailored talent and leadership development strategy, ensuring that key roles in compliance and leadership were equipped with the skills and knowledge necessary to navigate complex legal requirements and support the company's long-term goals. As a result, the company strengthened its strategic alignment and readiness for regulatory challenges.

6. Preparing an action plan aligned to organizational core values and assessment findings.

Preparing a DEI action plan aligned with an organization's core values and assessment findings ensures that DEI efforts are both strategic and authentic. This approach ties DEI initiatives directly to the organization's mission, fostering greater buy-in from stakeholders. By using assessment data, the plan targets specific areas for improvement, such as recruitment or employee development, and provides clear steps for progress. Aligning the plan with core values strengthens organizational culture and enhances employee engagement, driving lasting and meaningful change.

Below are examples of how we align action plans to the organization's values and assessment findings.

Regional non-profit retailer: We facilitated a half-day project kick-off workshop with the CEO and their executive leadership team, where we specifically discussed the organization's employee value proposition, its core values, and how their actions could demonstrate their employee brand or values in practice within the context of DEIB. Then, as part of the assessment phase, we deployed an organization-wide survey and conducted interviews with a large sample of employees across all levels and departments within the business to gather their perspectives on successes and opportunities for improvement in DEI at the organization.

We then hosted a day-long workshop with Board members, executive leadership, managers, and employees to develop a DEI vision, DEI goals, and an action plan for the organization.

We presented the values, discussion feedback from the kickoff, and findings from the assessment to the action planning workshop participants as input into the action planning portion of the workshop. Participants took that information and developed a strategic plan with specific actions over the course of a year to advance its mission work in the community and embed DEI principles in its talent management and development practices, supplier diversity, marketing, and community advocacy work. The plan provided a roadmap for advancing the organization's mission in the community while ensuring that DEI principles were embedded in every facet of its operations.

Global biotech company: An assessment of the company uncovered gaps in its organizational culture that impacted the effectiveness of its quality and compliance processes. We collaborated with the global executive leadership of the healthcare compliance team to create a culture evolution strategic plan, aligning it with the company's core values and assessment findings. The plan set short-, medium-, and long-term objectives to foster a culture of quality and compliance, incorporating ethics training, leadership toolkits, and a comprehensive communications strategy. As a result, leadership and employees adopted a compliance-driven mindset, enhancing accountability and promoting ethical practices and regulatory adherence throughout the organization.

7. Conducting DEI best practices research and provide analysis and reports.

Conducting DEI best practices research is essential to ensure that organizations are implementing effective strategies to foster inclusion and equity. By reviewing successful DEI models, policies, and practices across industries, researchers can identify what works and why. This analysis allows organizations to benchmark their initiatives, align with proven methods, and stay current with evolving DEI trends.

Below are examples of how we conduct research in DEI best practices to develop reports.

National Mid-Market Consulting Firm: A regional office of a management consulting firm lagged peers in the representation of women and people of color due to a lack of systemic DEI practices in recruiting, hiring, advancement, and retention practices. We consulted multiple sources on attraction, advancement, and retention best practices in professional services firms. Specifically, we reviewed DEI reports published by competitor consulting firms (Deloitte, PwC, and McKinsey) that provide data-driven insights and best practices for enhancing diversity in consulting firms. We reviewed Diversitylnc's Top 50 Companies for Diversity for strategies that would drive results. We attended a local DEI-focused conference that featured speakers from organizations with successful DEI programs. We accessed peer-reviewed journals, such as Harvard Business Review and other journals available through the academic platform JSTOR to uncover effective DEI initiatives for professional services organizations. Finally, we consulted The Centre for Global Inclusion's Global Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion benchmarks to assess where the client could mature its talent management practices and leadership commitment to DEI to improve its employee and leadership diversity.

Gathering information from these sources helped us gain an informed and broad understanding of best practices in DEI to apply to the particular organization. We presented our research findings to regional executive leadership team, who championed a DEI roadmap to implement recommended best practices.

Regional non-profit retailer: A non-profit experienced 80% employee turnover due to employee perception that culture was not inclusive, pay was not equitable, and there was a lack of career advancement opportunities. The organization wanted to incorporate DEI best practices into their culture. We consulted a variety of resources for best practices, including the Global Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion benchmarks; national retail federation reports on DEI initiatives in retail; corporate social responsibility reports from private and non-profit competitors, and reports from other regional non-profit retailers. We also interviewed a Chief Diversity, Equity and Inclusion officer for another regional non-profit retailer for DEI best practices that could be incorporated into talent management processes and how they overcame leader and employee resistance to DEI. Consulting these sources gave us a comprehensive view of how leading retail and non-profit organizations successfully integrate impactful DEI practices into their operations.

We incorporated the research into a report that we presented to the board and the executive leadership team to help them develop the DEI action plan.

8. Advising on best practices in procurement.

Incorporating supplier diversity in an organization's overall DEI strategy is essential for creating equitable opportunities for diverse suppliers and fostering an inclusive supply chain. It involves helping organizations implement strategies to ensure that minority-owned, women-owned, and other underrepresented businesses are considered in procurement decisions. This can lead to innovation, cost savings, and alignment with social responsibility goals.

Below is an example of how we helped an organization develop a supplier diversity program.

Regional non-profit retailer: Our approach to developing a supplier diversity program included conducting supplier diversity assessments, setting diversity spending targets, removing barriers for diverse suppliers, and promoting inclusive contracting practices. We advised them to regularly monitor and evaluate supplier engagement and performance to help sustain a diverse and equitable procurement ecosystem while driving business success.

Implementing this policy significantly increased the company's procurement from minority-owned businesses. Our recommendations for a comprehensive supplier diversity program, included outreach to diverse suppliers, mentorship opportunities, and targeted bidding processes. This would help expand the retailer's supplier base and help create economic opportunities for underrepresented small business owners in the communities where the non-profit operated.

9. Advising on best practices in hiring.

Advising on best practices in hiring for a DEI strategy is essential for building a more diverse and inclusive workforce. A DEI-focused hiring approach ensures that recruitment processes are free from bias, helping to attract candidates from a wide range of backgrounds. Best practices include writing inclusive job descriptions, implementing blind recruitment to eliminate bias, and using diverse interview panels. Additionally, actively sourcing candidates from underrepresented groups and leveraging partnerships with organizations that promote diversity can improve recruitment outcomes. By embedding DEI into hiring practices, organizations can foster a more innovative and equitable workplace that better represents their customer base.

Below are examples of how we advised on best practices in hiring for organizations.

National Mid-Market Management Consulting Firm: We provided training for Hiring Managers, Interviewers, and the Recruiting team on how to address unconscious biases in sourcing job candidates, conducting interviews, and making hiring decisions. We also offered guidance to the recruiting team on making systemic changes to job descriptions and the recruiting, interviewing, and hiring processes to mitigate unconscious bias in talent selection.

The revised job descriptions and recruiting processes resulted in a substantial increase in the diversity of our candidate pool. The Interviewers underwent training to conduct more inclusive interviews, focusing solely on candidates' skills and qualifications while actively challenging stereotypes, biases, and the notion of cultural fit. This holistic training initiative significantly heightened awareness of unconscious biases among the client's hiring managers, interviewers, and recruiting team, empowering them with the strategies to effectively address and mitigate these biases.

National Hospital and Medical Facility Provider: We advised the healthcare provider on implementing and improving employee adoption of human capital technology to support diverse hiring practices by tracking the representation of underrepresented groups across all job levels. This technology enabled the provider to proactively identify gaps in workforce diversity and ensure that hiring processes are equitable. The technology incorporated tools to reduce bias in recruitment and support targeted recruitment efforts for roles that reflect the diversity of the patient population, enhancing cultural competence in care delivery.

10. Advising on best practices in healthcare delivery equity and accessibility.

Advising on best practices in healthcare delivery equity and accessibility ensures that all individuals, regardless of background, have fair access to quality care. By evaluating current processes, identifying disparities, and implementing inclusive strategies, organizations can address systemic inequities in care. This includes improving access for underrepresented populations, enhancing cultural competence among providers, and ensuring equitable treatment outcomes. Recommendations tailored to these needs promote healthier communities and reduce barriers, driving better health outcomes for all while fostering an inclusive healthcare system that serves diverse populations effectively.

Below is an example of how we advised on best practices in healthcare delivery equity and accessibility for an organization.

Healthcare Software Technology Company: We advised a healthcare technology company on best practices to promote equity and accessibility of healthcare for their employees. To reach diverse employee populations to understand their needs and benefits usage, surveys were deployed in Spanish and Cambodian languages.

Key recommendations included:

- Expanding the maternity leave policy to be a more inclusive parental leave policy, covering adopted, surrogate, nonbinary, and same-sex couples, and incorporating fathers and nonbinary individuals.
- Implementing gender-affirming care policies and helped integrate inclusive language into healthcare documents.
- Developing a flexible work-from-home and hybrid policy.
- Offering employees healthcare plan options beyond the default, including credits for health plan exchanges.

Additionally, we educated employees and brokers on accessing wellness and mental health plans and providing healthcare information in multiple languages to enhance accessibility.

Incorporating principles of equity into the organization's approach to employee healthcare, led to:

<u>Increased Employee Satisfaction and Inclusivity</u>: Expanding the parental leave policy and introducing gender-affirming care created a more inclusive environment, leading to higher employee satisfaction and retention, particularly among nonbinary, LGBTQ+, and diverse family structures.

<u>Improved Access to Healthcare</u>: Offering healthcare plan options, including credits for health plan exchanges, allowed employees greater flexibility in choosing plans that best suited their needs, improving access to healthcare and enhancing overall employee well-being.

<u>Enhanced Cultural Competency and Engagement</u>: By deploying surveys in Spanish and Cambodian and providing healthcare information in multiple languages, the company demonstrated a commitment to serving its diverse workforce, leading to better employee engagement and more equitable access to benefits and resources.

11. Advising on the inclusion of diversity best practices in the investment industry.

We have a strong track record of advising investment firms on incorporating DEI best practices. We understand the unique dynamics of the investment industry and have effectively communicated the direct connection between DEI and strong investment performance. We emphasized to clients that DEI is not merely a box to tick for social responsibility; it's a strategic lever for maximizing investment returns. We present research demonstrating that companies with strong DEI practices often outperform their peers, resonating with clients because diverse teams make better decisions and are more innovative. Below is an example of how we advised on DEI practices in the investment industry.

Global wealth management and investment banking company: The organization struggled to attract underrepresented talent for hire and experienced higher turnover among its female investment bankers and employees of color. We developed and rolled out a series of live DEI trainings with 500 bankers across all levels to equip them with the knowledge and skills to create and maintain inclusive environments. It addressed biases, helped them understand diverse perspectives, and equipped them with the knowledge to foster a workplace where everyone felt valued, respected, and had equal opportunities. The training also included a deep dive into the tangible benefits of DEI for their clients, including how to integrate DEI analysis into their due diligence processes to identify and mitigate risks and develop more informed investment decisions, improve portfolio performance, and enhance their employer value proposition to attract and retain top talent.

We also helped them develop a mentorship program and created a guide for establishing employee resource groups, as there was a higher rate of voluntary attrition among younger employees of color. By developing a mentorship program specifically for employees of color, we helped the firm reduce its associate turnover rate from 60% to 35%. Mentorship provided crucial support, guidance, and networking opportunities, enabling employees to navigate career advancement effectively.

12. Advising on DEI best practices for public sector organizations that are consistent with federal and state law, including Section 31 of Article I of the California Constitution (commonly known as "Proposition 209").

Advising on DEI best practices for public sector organizations in California, particularly in light of Proposition 209, is essential because it involves navigating legal restrictions while promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion. Since Proposition 209 prohibits state institutions from considering race, sex, or ethnicity in public employment, education, and contracting, we would develop recommendations that foster inclusivity while balancing these requirements. This involves focusing on race-neutral approaches, such as expanding outreach to underrepresented communities, implementing equitable hiring practices, and fostering an inclusive culture. Providing reports and recommendations tailored to comply with Proposition 209 ensures that organizations can advance DEI without violating legal mandates.

Specifically, we would:

- Develop hiring and recruitment practices that focus on socioeconomic background, geographic location, and educational disparities, ensuring opportunities for historically underrepresented groups. Develop programs that support candidates from underfunded schools, veterans, or first-generation professionals.
- Implement policies to ensure equitable access to mentorship, professional development, and training opportunities for all employees.
- Ensure health equity by designing inclusive health and wellness programs that address
 disparities affecting all employees, particularly based on income, geographic location, and
 access to care. Offer universal benefits, including mental health support, flexible work
 arrangements, and programs that address social determinants of health, to ensure all
 employees can access quality care and wellness resources without discrimination.
- Use data to understand gaps in employee advancement and focus on merit-based strategies that reward skills, achievements, and potential. Promote transparency in promotions and pay to ensure fairness.
- Focus investment decisions on companies that align with environmental, social, and governance (ESG) goals, which include factors such as corporate governance, labor practices, and sustainability.

These are some of the approaches that we would take to help CalPERs create an inclusive and equitable culture without violating Proposition 209.

13. Developing communication strategies highlighting the importance of DEI.

Developing communication strategies that highlight the importance of DEI is essential for fostering a culture of inclusion and accountability. Effective communication ensures that all employees understand the organization's commitment to DEI, the value it brings, and how they can contribute. The approach involves creating clear and consistent messaging across platforms, using inclusive language, and tailoring content to diverse audiences. Regular updates, success stories, and transparent progress reporting further reinforce the importance of DEI, aligning the entire organization toward shared goals of diversity and equity.

Below is an example of how we helped an organization develop communication strategies highlighting the importance of DEI.

National Mid-Market Management Consulting Firm: We spearheaded a collaborative effort with the Chief Diversity Officer and Marketing Director to craft and execute a dynamic internal and external communications strategy and calendar for their firm's DE&I initiatives. Our aim was to not only boost awareness among employees and clients about their DE&I activities but also to foster a more inclusive culture. We set specific communication goals and closely monitored employee engagement to gauge the impact of our DE&I messaging. Our strategy encompassed a diverse range of communication mediums, including newsletter articles, podcasts, townhall updates, CEO messages, office hours, and the company website, ensuring that we reached employees across the board.

The topics that we communicated about included:

- Progress updates on DEI goals and strategy, key metrics (e.g., representation, pay equity), and areas where the organization is making improvements.
- Special DEI related initiatives such as the BIPOC sponsorship program and time off for voting.
- CEO responses to racial crises. We also designed a checklist to help the organization decide when to address racial crises happening in the country.
- Cultural holidays and heritage months and company-wide events celebrating those events.
- Sharing information about ERGs, how employees could participate and events that they held so employees could participate.
- DEI-related training sessions, workshops, and learning opportunities that focused on bias mitigation, allyship and inclusive leadership.
- Updates on benefit programs and policies that promote work-life balance, accessibility, inclusive benefits, and support for underrepresented groups.

Furthermore, we developed an inclusive language guide to avoid stereotyping, discriminatory and biased messaging in company communications.

CalPERS Board of Administration requires contract participation from certified Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBEs) in its contract process, unless specifically exempted. Only State of California, Office of Small Business and DVBE Services (OSDS) may certify a DVBE. - 3. It is a sole proprietorship, corporation, or partnership with its home office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign based business.

Commercially Useful Function A DVBE contractor, subcontractors, or supplier is considered performing a commercially useful function when it meets all of the following criteria:

- 1. The business concern is:
 - (a) Responsible for the execution of a distinct element of the work of the contract;
 - (b) Carries out its obligation by actually performing, managing, or supervising the work involved;
 - (c) Performs work that is normal for its business, services and function; and
- 2. The business concern is not further subcontracting a greater portion of the work that is greater than would be expected by normal industry practices.

A contractor, subcontractor, or supplier will not be considered to perform a commercially useful function if the contractor's, subcontractor's, or supplier's role is limited to that of an extra participant in a transaction, contract, or project through which funds are passed in order to obtain the appearance of small business, microbusiness, or DVBE participation. Meeting the Goal

- 1. Proposing incentive goal attainment is a <u>commitment</u> to use disabled veteran business enterprises for the established percent of the contract amount. If awarded a contract, CalPERS expects the DVBE subcontractors or suppliers to be utilized as identified in your proposal, unless a substitution is approved by CalPERS.
- 2. An expression of <u>intent</u> to subcontract with unidentified DVBE firms at some future date <u>is insufficient</u> to comply with DVBE incentive participation. Commitments must be finalized upon submission of your contract participation documentation to CalPERS.
- 3. **Out-of-state firms** are not excluded from participating in the DVBE incentive program. To do business with CalPERS, completion of this document is required for all bidders.

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Note: While individual UC and CSU campuses operate as public institutions, the UC Office of the President and the California State University System, Chancellor's Office function as the corporate administrative entity for the system-wide organization with over 500 employees.

Summary of Advisory Services: Over the past decade, our team has served as trusted DEI advisors across nonprofit, public, private, and governmental sectors, offering strategic guidance rooted in equity, cultural intelligence, and systems change management. We have partnered with educational institutions, state agencies, school districts, corporations, philanthropic foundations, and community-based organizations to build capacity and embed equity into policies, procedures, and practices that drive measurable impact.

Our work includes supporting executive teams in sharpening their DEI lens, developing inclusive hiring and onboarding practices, redesigning workplace culture, and building trauma-informed, psychologically safe environments. Additionally, we host focused board retreats and focus groups to gather deeper insights about members' specific interests and the constituents they represent, cross-referencing all responses to develop comprehensive assessment reports.

This approach centers the board's strategic perspective and priorities while anchoring our findings in the lived experiences of those impacted by their governance.

5. Meeting with executive leadership as part of the assessment and information-gathering process.

We employ a comprehensive, multi-tiered approach when meeting with executive leadership and Cabinet-level leaders to conduct assessments and gather critical information for organizational transformation processes and operational excellence.

Executive Leaders Engagement Methodology: Our approach begins with a tailored pre-survey to capture baseline insights, informing the development of broader interview questions and job-embedded questions specific to each executive leader's role in advancing the mission and priorities of the Board. We apply salient coding to analyze the depth and meaning of their responses, followed by pattern coding to identify common themes and conduct gap analysis between stated goals and current practices.

We complement survey data with focus groups and interviews, offering executive leaders space to express their unique challenges and priorities. 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DISABLED VETERAN BUSINESS ENTERPRISE CONTRACT PARTICIPATION

CalPERS Board of Administration requires contract participation from certified Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBEs) in its contract process, unless specifically exempted. Only State of California, Office of Small Business and DVBE Services (OSDS) may certify a DVBE. The DVBE must perform a commercially useful function relevant to this solicitation to be considered compliant with the DVBE program requirements. In order to obtain DVBE incentive participation credit, the contractor must be a certified DVBE or subcontract with a DVBE, certified by OSDS, no later than the Final Filing Date as specified in the Schedule of Events.

Please read the following requirements carefully. Completion of this document is required regardless of intent to pursue DVBE incentive participation.

I. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

For the purpose of this DVBE incentive participation, the following definitions apply:

- A. *Disabled veteran* means a veteran of the military, naval, or air services of the United States with a **service-connected disability of ten percent or more**, who is a resident of the State of California.
- **B. DVBE** means a business concern <u>certified by OSDS</u> as meeting all of the following:
 - 1. A sole proprietorship at least 51 percent owned by one or more disabled veterans; or in the case of a publicly owned business, at least 51 percent of its stock is owned by one or more disabled veterans; a subsidiary which is wholly owned by a parent corporation, but only if at least 51 percent of the voting stock of the parent corporation is owned by one or more disabled veterans; or a joint venture in which at least 51 percent of the joint venture's management and control and earnings are held by one or more disabled veterans.
 - 2. The management and control of the daily business operations are by one or more disabled veterans. The disabled veterans who exercise management and control are not required to be the same disabled veterans as the owners of the business concern.
 - 3. It is a sole proprietorship, corporation, or partnership with its home office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign based business.

- **C. Commercially Useful Function** A DVBE contractor, subcontractors, or supplier is considered performing a commercially useful function when it meets all of the following criteria:
 - 1. The business concern is:
 - (a) Responsible for the execution of a distinct element of the work of the contract;
 - (b) Carries out its obligation by actually performing, managing, or supervising the work involved;
 - (c) Performs work that is normal for its business, services and function; and
 - 2. The business concern is not further subcontracting a greater portion of the work that is greater than would be expected by normal industry practices.

A contractor, subcontractor, or supplier will not be considered to perform a commercially useful function if the contractor's, subcontractor's, or supplier's role is limited to that of an extra participant in a transaction, contract, or project through which funds are passed in order to obtain the appearance of small business, microbusiness, or DVBE participation. When subcontracting to small, micro, or DVBE subcontractors, the intent is for the subcontractor to provide goods or services required for the performance of the contract rather than artificial or incidental participation that provides an "appearance" of participation to meet the socio-economic objectives of these programs.

II. DVBE PARTICIPATION OPTIONS AND DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS

In order to be **responsive** to the incentive participation, bidders will complete and submit Attachment G, Exhibit 1, DVBE Contract Participation and select one of the following options:

- A. <u>Option A DVBE Incentive.</u> A bidder may submit DVBE participation percentages to receive and qualify for the incentive program. Bids that fail to submit the required form and confirm the level of DVBE participation will not be eligible to receive the DVBE incentive. Refer to RFP, Section V Proposal Requirements, A(8) Technical Proposal/Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise Contract Participation and Incentive.
- B. **Option B- No DVBE Incentive Participation.** A bidder may opt out of participation in the DVBE incentive program.

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USE/SUBSTITUTION OF PROPOSED DVBE

If awarded the contract, the successful bidder must use the DVBE subcontractor and/or supplier proposed in their final bid/proposal unless the contractor requests substitution via prior written notice to CalPERS and CalPERS approves such substitution. At a minimum, the request must include:

- A. A written explanation for the substitution;
- B. The identity of the person or firm substituted;
- Any change in the work or dollar/percentage amount caused by the substitution;
 and
- D. A revised DVBE Contract Participation (Attachment G, Exhibit 1) and applicable certification(s).

The request and CalPERS approval or disapproval of the substitution shall not affect compliance with any other provision of law, or any other contract requirements relating to substitution of subcontractors.

III. QUESTIONS

The information below is provided to answer commonly asked questions and clarify potential misconceptions of the contract participation goal requirement. Meeting the Goal

- 1. Proposing incentive goal attainment is a <u>commitment</u> to use disabled veteran business enterprises for the established percent of the contract amount. If awarded a contract, CalPERS expects the DVBE subcontractors or suppliers to be utilized as identified in your proposal, unless a substitution is approved by CalPERS.

All DEI consulting aligns DEI services to the "business case," of the organization, whether the business is to increase profits, achieve mission, or serve the community.

Moreover, Dr. Arciniega and Dr. Maceyko understand the laws and regulations governing public, private, non-profit, and governmental diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging initiatives. Both Dr. Arciniega and Dr. Maceyko, as experts, have helped professional organizations navigate the new and constantly-changing political terrain. Dr. Maceyko, as Chair, Public Policy, American Association for University Women CA, collaborates with board members, legislative advocates, and partners with organizations to set the annual legislative agenda and select co-sponsored and priority legislation. She also authors legislation and public education campaigns and sets

Dr. Luzilda Arciniega has over a decade of conducting DEI best practices research and providing analysis and reports. She completed her dissertation on how DEI professionals create best practices and advocate for DEI in corporate firms. In her dissertation she assessed how diversity professionals used best practices tools, like the Global Diversity Equity Inclusion Benchmarks (GDEI), surveys from DiversityInc. (now Fair360) and Diversity Best Practices (now Seramount) to create strategic reports, create evidence of the impact of DEI initiatives, and compete in the labor market and against their industry competitors. Since the inauguration of President Trump, Fair360 and Seramount have made private the previously-public results of their benchmarking surveys.

With the National Diversity Council, she oversaw the NDC Index, a 200-question survey that measured organizational commitment to diversity and inclusion among companies in the U.S that had over 500 employees. Through an annual survey, the Index rated company performance on CEO engagement and corporate initiatives, policies, and programs.  - 3. It is a sole proprietorship, corporation, or partnership with its home office located in the United States, which is not a branch or subsidiary of a foreign corporation, foreign firm, or other foreign based business.

- C. Commercially Useful Function A DVBE contractor, subcontractors, or supplier is considered performing a commercially useful function when it meets all of the following criteria:
 - 1. The business concern is:
 - (a) Responsible for the execution of a distinct element of the work of the contract;
 - (b) Carries out its obligation by actually performing, managing, or supervising the work involved;
 - (c) Performs work that is normal for its business, services and function; and
 - The business concern is not further subcontracting a greater portion of the work that is greater than would be expected by normal industry practices.

- b.) **Tax Classification**. The Company shall be classified for tax purposes as a(n) Partnership.
- c.) **Business Purpose**. Willing Observers LLC provides consulting, advising, and management services, drawing on both standard DEI best practices and local cultural insights to create strategies to help organizations engage in sustainable and inclusive culture-change
- d.) **Term**. In Perpetuity.
- e.) **Fiscal Year-End (Tax Purposes)**. The last day of the month of December.
- **2. MEMBERS**. The Company is formed with the following Members:

3. VOTING REQUIREMENTS.

- a.) **Business Decisions**. Business decisions related to the Company's activities, finances, and management shall be made by majority decision by the Members.
- b.) **Amending this Agreement**. Any amendments to this Agreement shall be made by majority decision by the Members.
- c.) **Adding New Members**. Adding new Members to this Company shall be made by majority decision by the Members.
- d.) **Withdrawing Members**. To allow Members to withdraw shall be made by majority decision by the Members.

- e.) **Dissolving the Company**. To dissolve the Company and cease business activities, this shall be made by majority decision by the Members.
- **4. VOTING RIGHTS**. When votes are cast by Members as required under Section 3, or for any decision regarding the Company, each Member's vote shall be counted equally, regardless of their ownership of the Company.
- **5. MANAGEMENT**. Any and all decisions of the Company shall be made by the Members.
- **6. MEMBERS' AUTHORITY**. The authority to make decisions that can potentially bind the Company, legally or financially, can be made by any Member.
- **7. DISTRIBUTIONS**. Company profits shall be distributed at the Members' sole discretion.
- **8. MEETINGS**. Company meetings shall be held, with all Members expected to be present, only when required or called upon by the Members.
- **9. PROFITS AND LOSSES**. The allocation of profits and losses of the Company shall be shared equally among the Members, no matter their ownership interest.
- **10. NON-COMPETE**. A Member's ability to compete in the same or similar business as the Company shall be prohibited and not allowed under any circumstance.
- **11. CAPITAL CONTRIBUTIONS**. No initial Capital Contributions shall be made at the time of this Agreement by any of the Members.
- **12. TIME COMMITMENTS**. No Member is required to devote time to the Company as part of their ownership interest.
- **13. ANNUAL REPORTS**. The Company must provide the following to each of the Members: tax reports (K-1 forms and annual tax returns), profit and loss (summary), income statement, balance sheet, cash flow statement,
- **14. SELLING TO NON-MEMBERS**. not allowed to sell to non-Members. No Member is permitted to assign, transfer, sell, pledge, or otherwise dispose of their ownership interest in the Company to non-Members, whether voluntarily or involuntarily, without all the other Members' prior unanimous written consent.
- **15. RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL**. If a Member decides to sell, assign, transfer, or otherwise dispose of ownership interest in the Company, the Company or its Members must be given the same rights to purchase under the same terms and conditions.
- **16. LIABILITY**. If any Member and any authorized person acting under the management of the Company, or under the capacity of any officer, director, stockholder, partner, member, affiliate, employee, agent, or representative of the Company ("Covered Person") shall not be liable to the Company or any Covered Person for any loss, damage, or claim incurred because of any action taken or omitted to be taken by such Covered Person in their respective capacity, so long as such action or omission does not constitute fraud or willful misconduct. This Agreement is not intended to, and shall not, create or impose any fiduciary duty on any Covered Person. Each Member and the Company hereby waive any fiduciary duties that, absent such waiver, may be implied by Governing Law, and in doing so, acknowledge and agree that the duties and obligations of

each Covered Person to each other and the Company are only as expressly outlined in this Agreement. The provisions of this Agreement, to the extent that they restrict the duties and liabilities of a Covered Person otherwise existing or at law or in equity, are agreed by each Member to replace such other duties and liabilities.

- **17. INDEMNIFICATION**. The Company will indemnify any person who is or was a defendant, or is threatened to be made a defendant, in a pending or completed action, suit, or proceeding (excluding actions by or in the right of the Company) due to their role as a Member, employee, or agent of the Company, or their service at the Company's request. This indemnification covers expenses (including attorney's fees), judgments, fines, and amounts paid in settlement that are actually and reasonably incurred in connection with such action, suit, or proceeding, provided that the Member determines the individual's actions were in, or not opposed to, the best interest of the Company. For any criminal action or proceeding, the individual must have had no reasonable cause to believe their conduct was unlawful. The termination of any action, suit, or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction, or plea of no contest does not by itself create a presumption regarding whether the person acted in good faith or in a manner they reasonably believed to be in the best interest of the Company, or, in the case of a criminal action or proceeding, whether they had reasonable cause to believe their conduct was lawful.
- **18. CAPITAL CONTRIBUTIONS**. The Members may make an initial Capital Contribution, although there is no obligation to make such a contribution unless otherwise mentioned. If a Capital Contribution is made, it shall not receive interest based on its cash amount or non-cash value. Any Capital Contributions made shall be reflected in the capital accounts. Return of any Capital Contributions, if made, shall be at the Members' discretion. It is understood by all Members that Capital Contributions made are not loans to the Company.
 - a.) Additional Contributions. Capital Contributions may be added from time to time in accordance with the needs of the Company. If an additional Capital Contribution is required, and a Member is unwilling or unable to meet the additional contribution requirement within the period granted to all other Members, the remaining Members may contribute proportionately to their existing Capital Contributions to resolve the amount in default. In such case, the allocation of profits, losses, and distribution of assets shall be adjusted accordingly to compensate for the Member's deficiency. Any Capital Contribution made by a Member more than the amounts provided in this Agreement, specifically cash payments, shall be deemed a debt due from the Company rather than an increase in the Capital Contributions from a specific Member. This liability shall be repaid with interest at such rates that are voted upon by the remaining Members. This liability shall not entitle the lending Member to any increased share of the Company's profits nor a greater voting power. Repayment of such Company debts shall take precedence over any other future payments to the remaining Members.
 - b.) <u>Contractual Obligations</u>. If any Member fails to fulfill their Capital Contribution mentioned in this Agreement within 90 days, they agree to be withdrawn from the Company, and their ownership shall be forfeited in proportion to the ownership of the remaining Members. This section is in addition to and does not replace, any other rights the Company may have against the Member, including the right to specific performance.
 - c.) <u>Interest</u>. No interest or borrowing fees shall be charged with the Capital Contributions made by Members.
 - d.) <u>Withdrawal</u>. No Member shall be able to withdraw any portion of their Capital Contributions without the unanimous written consent of the other Members.
- **19. INVOLUNTARY WITHDRAWAL**. The circumstances leading to the involuntary removal from the Company include but are not limited to the death of a Member, mental incapacity, disability preventing reasonable participation in the Company, incompetence, breach of fiduciary duties, criminal conviction, legal actions against a Member, or a legal judgment that could harm the business or societal reputation of the

Company. A Member may also be expelled upon application by the Company or another Member if it is judicially determined that the Member has engaged in wrongful conduct that significantly and negatively impacts the Company's business; has willfully or repeatedly committed a material breach of this Agreement or a duty owed to the Company or other Members; or has engaged in conduct related to the Company's business that makes it impractical to continue business operations with that Member. The involuntary withdrawal of a Member does not affect the continuation of the Company.

- **20. WITHDRAWING MEMBERS**. A Member can withdraw from the Company if permitted under the voting requirements. If a Member decides to withdraw, they must provide written notice to the Company, which shall be voted upon at the next meeting. If a request to withdraw from the Company is voted on and accepted, it must be processed and finalized within a reasonable time period. After the withdrawing Member's departure, the remaining Members can decide whether or not to dissolve the Company.
- **21. DISSOCIATION**. When a Member withdraws from the Company, voluntarily or involuntarily, and the remaining Members decide to purchase the withdrawing Member's ownership interest, they must provide written notice of their decision. This notice, detailing the purchase price and the payment method and schedule, should be given to the withdrawing Member or their legal representative within a reasonable time after the change in circumstances is known. The buyout amount for the Member's interests will be determined according to Section 23 of this Agreement. The remaining Members shall have the right to seek damages from the departing Member if the withdrawal occurred due to malicious or criminal actions, a breach of fiduciary duties, or any conduct likely to harm the Company or its reputation in the public domain. A withdrawing Member is only liable for Company obligations incurred during their time as a Member. After withdrawal, the Company will handle all legal notices to protect the departing Member from future liabilities. If the remaining Members buy out the departing Member's ownership interest, the full payment shall be made within 90 days of withdrawal, without interest. The Company retains exclusive rights to all trade names, firm names, and related brand and model names, regardless of the Member's name on the application or renewal certificates.
- **22. DISSOLUTION**. At the Member's decision, the affairs of the Company may be wound down and dissolved. Upon the dissolution of the Company, it shall immediately commence to wind down its affairs and for the Member to liquidate, sell, or transfer the business operations and assets of the Company. If debts are owed at the time of dissolution, the Company must pay creditors first before distributing cash, assets, and/or initial capital to the Member or any other economic interests.
- **23. EQUAL FINANCIAL INTEREST**. In the event of a dissociation or dissolution, each Member shall retain an equal financial interest in the Company in accordance with their ownership interest. Without a written agreement establishing a value, the Company's value shall be assessed based on the fair market value of all Company assets minus liabilities while following generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). An independent accounting firm, mutually agreed upon by all Members, shall conduct such appraisal. An appraiser shall be appointed within a reasonable period following the dissociation or dissolution. The appraisal's results will be binding on all Members. This section ensures the Company's survival despite any Member's dissociation. No value should be assigned to goodwill, trade names, patents, or other intangible assets unless these assets were recorded in the Company's records before any such valuation.
- **24. SEVERABILITY**. If any provision of this Agreement shall be declared to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, such provision shall survive to the extent it is not so declared, and the validity, legality, and enforceability of the other provisions hereof shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby unless such action would substantially impair the benefits to any party of the remaining provisions of this Agreement.

25. MISCELLANEOUS.

- a.) <u>Amendments</u>. Any amendment to this Agreement must be agreed to in accordance with the Voting Requirements in Section 3(b). After a successful vote, the approving Members must sign the amendment and attach it to this Agreement.
- b.) <u>Audit Rights</u>. Each Member shall have the right, at their own expense, to audit the financials of the Company. Such audits shall be conducted during normal business hours and with reasonable notice. During the audit, the Company shall make available all necessary books, records, and documents relevant to the Company's financial condition, including but not limited to the general ledger, spreadsheets, bank statements, tax returns, and any related financial documents.
- c.) <u>Binding Arrangement</u>. This Agreement and the terms and conditions contained herein apply to and are binding upon each Member's successors, assigns, executors, administrators, beneficiaries, and representatives.
- d.) <u>Business Days</u>. Refers to the standard five days of the work week, Monday through Friday, excluding federally recognized public holidays.
- e.) <u>Business Decisions</u>. As mentioned in Section 3(a), refers to a wide range of decisions to be made on behalf of the Company, including but not limited to the day-to-day activities, entering into agreements with third parties, lending money, obtaining loans, buying or selling assets, and any other act that directly or indirectly affects the Company's operations, assets, and liabilities.
- f.) Forbidden Acts. Members are strictly forbidden from any act that:
 - i. Is in contravention of this Agreement;
 - ii. Permits, intentionally or unintentionally, the assignment of express, implied, or apparent authority to a third party that is not a Member;
 - iii. Would make it impossible to carry on the ordinary business of the Company;
 - iv. Will have the right or authority to bind or obligate the Company to any extent with regard to any matter outside the intended purpose of the Company;
 - v. Confesses a judgment against the Company; or
 - vi. Violates any of the forbidden acts in this section of which shall be deemed an involuntary withdrawal and may be treated accordingly by the remaining Members.
- g.) Fiscal Year-End. Shall be the last day of the month mentioned in Section 1(e).
- h.) <u>Force Majeure</u>. A Member shall be free of liability to the Company where the Member is prevented from executing their obligations under this Agreement in whole or in part due to force majeure, also known as acts of God, which include but are not limited to floods, fires, and other natural disasters. In addition, this includes human-created acts such as terrorism, war, or other types of attacks which are unforeseen or out of the control of the Company or its Members. A Member must communicate the circumstance of any such event mentioned in this section to the other Members and to take all appropriate action to satisfy the Company's duties and obligations and mitigate the effects of said event.
- i.) <u>Goodwill</u>. The Company's goodwill shall be assessed at an amount to be determined by appraisal using generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP).
- j.) <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the statutory laws, regulations, and rules of the State of Formation without giving effect to any choice or conflict of law provision or rule, whether of the State of Formation or any other jurisdiction.
 - <u>i. Precedence of Agreement</u>. In the event a provision of this Agreement shall differ from what is written under Governing Law, this Agreement shall take precedence to the extent it is legal.
- k.) <u>Liability Insurance</u>. The Company is allowed to acquire insurance on behalf of any Member, employee, agent, or other person engaged in the Company's business interests against any liability asserted against them or incurred by them while acting in good faith on behalf of the Company.
- l.) <u>Life Insurance</u>. The Company shall have the right to acquire life insurance on the lives of any or all of the Members whenever it is deemed necessary. Each Member shall cooperate fully with the Company in obtaining any such policies.

- m.) <u>Management</u>. The Company's business and affairs shall be managed, operated, and controlled by or under the selection made in Section 4. Such management selection shall have full authority to take necessary actions to achieve the Company's objectives and legally bind the Company into certain agreements and contracts. No other individual or entity has the authority to act on behalf of the Company unless specific written authority has otherwise been granted.
 - i. <u>Manager's Removal</u>. If the Company is managed by a Manager, the Members can remove the Manager at any time by vote in accordance with Section 3(a).
 - ii. <u>Manager's Compensation</u>. If compensation is paid to a Manager who is making decisions on behalf of the Company, the payment made by the Company to the Manager is for their services performed. The compensation amount can be changed at any time, whether or not it is amended in this Agreement.
- n.) <u>Meetings</u>. For any issue or subject matter regarding the company, a meeting can be requested and scheduled by providing reasonable notice to the other Members.
 - i. <u>Meeting Agenda</u>. If a Member requests an agenda prior to a meeting, it must be provided to the Members within a reasonable time before the meeting and outline the topics to be discussed.
 - ii. <u>Meeting Minutes</u>. Notes on the topics covered in a meeting should be made available to each Member after a meeting. This should include the topics of discussion, recording of votes, agreements made, or any consensus of decisions made among the Members.
 - iii. <u>Voting</u>. Any decision related to the company's business affairs can be voted upon. Any Member can request a vote.
 - iv. <u>Quorum</u>. A quorum for conducting business at a meeting shall consist of Members representing at least 50% of the Company's ownership.
- o.) <u>Members</u>. A Member mentioned herein is a legal and registered owner of the Company in accordance with any conditions, stipulations, or obligations outlined in this Agreement.
- p.) <u>Non-Compete</u>. A non-compete, if beholden under this Agreement, shall bear the following protections to the Company and limitations upon each Member:
 - i. <u>Confidentiality</u>. To protect the Company's business interests, including but not limited to its trade secrets, confidential information, and customer relationships.
 - ii. <u>Restrictive Covenant</u>. During the membership in the Company and for a period of one year following the termination of membership, sale of the Company, or upon its dissolution, a Member cannot, directly or indirectly, engage in, own, manage, operate, control, be employed by, participate in, or be connected in any manner with the ownership, management, operation, or control of any business that competes with or is similar to the business of the Company for a geographic area covering the United States.
 - iii. <u>Non-Solicitation</u>. During the membership in the Company and for a period of one year following the termination of membership, sale of the Company, or upon its dissolution, a Member cannot, directly or indirectly, solicit or attempt to solicit any employee, contractor, customer, or client of the Company for the purpose in engaging in a business that competes with the Company.
- q.) <u>Officers</u>. Individuals who may or may not be members shall be elected and appointed by vote as part of the general decisions of the Company. Officers may be changed, re-appointed, or vacated at any time.
- r.) <u>Ownership of Company Property</u>. Ownership of all Company property shall be titled in the Company's name, not any individual Members.
- s.) <u>Purpose</u>. The business purpose is written in this Agreement for documentation reasons only. The Company is entitled to perform, engage, or be associated with any legal business purpose under the law.
- t.) <u>Record-Keeping</u>. The Company shall always maintain the following records for access to any of the Members:

- i. <u>Financial Status</u>. Information related to the Company's business status and financial condition.
- ii. <u>Tax Records</u>. A copy of Federal, State, County, and any other tax records, filings, statements, and receipts for a period as required per Internal Revenue Service rules.
- iii. <u>Members' Details</u>. The details of each Member, including but not limited to their contact details, ownership interest, capital contributions, loans, distributions, and the date of becoming a Member.
- iv. <u>Company Records</u>. The Company shall retain all its agreements, such as this Agreement and with any third parties. In addition, any formation documents such as articles of organization or any documents filed with the State or Federal authorities must be kept in a safe and accessible location available to any of the Members.
- v. <u>Right to Access</u>. Each Member shall have the right to access a copy of any of the Company records mentioned herein provided that reasonable time has been given to produce such request.
- u.) <u>Registered Agent</u>. The registered agent and office of the Company shall be the same as recorded and filed with the Secretary of State. Such details were recorded and filed with the Secretary of State on the formation documents or when filing an annual report.
 - i. <u>Service of Process</u>. The registered agent and office of the Company shall serve as the service of process. As required by Governing Law, the registered agent shall meet the requirements of being open to accept notices.

v.) Right of First Refusal.

- i. <u>First Priority</u>. The Company shall have first priority to accept the sale terms of a separate offer for the purchase of Company ownership within 15 business days from receipt of notice.
- ii. <u>Second Priority</u>. The Members shall collectively have a second priority in accepting the sale terms of a separate offer to purchase Company ownership. Each Member shall have a period of 5 business days from receipt of notice to accept, with priority given to Members with the largest allocation of ownership.
- iii. <u>Same Terms</u>. If the Company or any Member agrees to the terms of the first right of refusal, they shall be obligated to purchase such Company ownership under the same terms as the separate offer unless otherwise agreed upon by the selling Member.
- iv. <u>Minimum Timeframe</u>. Regardless of the terms mentioned in any separate offer, a purchaser acting on their right of first refusal shall have a minimum of 120 days to close and complete the sale.
- w.) <u>Secretary of State</u>. Refers to the office or department where the Company is registered in the State of Governing Law. The term "Secretary of State" is a general term, whether or not such office exists with such title in the State of Governing Law or if the Secretary of State's office is responsible for the formation of business entities.
- x.) <u>Time</u>. Time is of the essence in this Agreement. Any delay in the performance of obligations shall constitute a material breach.
- y.) <u>Time Commitments</u>. If any Member is required to commit time to the Company, it shall be dedicated to its business affairs as determined by the Members. If a Member that is beholden to this Time Commitment requirement does not fulfill their performance to the full term mentioned, their ownership under this Agreement can be subject to forfeiture.
- **26. ENTIRE AGREEMENT**. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the Members with all negotiations and understandings having been included. Any statements or representations that may have been made by any Member during the negotiation stages of this Agreement, may in some way be inconsistent with this final written Agreement. All such statements have no force or effect with respect to this Agreement. Only the written terms of this Agreement shall bind the Members.

27. ACKNOWLEDGMENT. By signing below, the undersigned acknowledge that they have read and agree to this Agreement, including all terms and conditions. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original, and all of which shall constitute one instrument.
